## German Family Hides Downed Yankee Flier

THE DALLES, Ore., Jan. 19 — (AP)—L. Lester Carlile, now home on furlough here, related that he spent 72 days inside the Reich, with a German army deserter as his companion, after his Thunderbolt fighter plane was shot down.

A German family sheltered the pair while Nazi troops searched the area, he said. The lieutenant and the German finally learned that American troops were approaching the village where they hid, whereupon they started for the battle area.

As they neared advance allied lines, both spoke English and walked down the middle of the road to avoid being shot as Nazi soldiers, Carlile reported. His answer when an American sentry at a bridge asked for the password was, "How the hell would I know!"
