Germany Increase Land, Air Power On Italian Front
ROME, Jan. 23.—(AP)—Marshal Kesselring's army of Italy was reported today to have risen to 28 divisions, its greatest strength since last spring.

(This dispatch, passed through censorship, did not bring out where Kesselring had obtained additional men for the front, but it is possible they were transferred from garrison duty in northern Italy. The German force previously was reported to total 25 divisions.)

Patrols engaged in several battles, particularly in the snow-bound mountains southeast of Bologna.

German airmen flew onto the scene again for the first time in several days, making eight scattered attacks south of Bologna aimed particularly at supply routes. One enemy plane was hit and probably destroyed.

German planes also bombed forward positions east of Alfonso, a Senio river stronghold of the Germans in the Eighth army sector on the allied right flank, but caused neither serious damage nor casualties.

Allied planes were out in strength with concentrated attacks on enemy communications and storage dumps in northern Italy. One formation ranged to within 20 miles of the Austrian border on the Brenner pass route with what a communique called "good results."

In these operations one enemy aircraft was reported destroyed and 10 allied planes failed to return.

Reedsport C. of C. Meets, Joins Unit Of Three Counties

REEDSPORT—The Reedsport chamber of commerce held its first meeting of the year last Tuesday, with Sid Samuelson, the new president, presiding and with a very good representation of members in attendance.

Mr. Samuelson announced that the new board of directors had held their first meeting; that for the present Rev. J. G. Griffiths would continue as secretary at the regular salary of \$15 per month and that the board had also allowed a salary of \$15 per month to the treasurer, Fred Wright, and that he was in full charge of the collection of membership dues and assessments.

Secretary Griffiths made a report on his visit to Gold Beach to attend the organization meeting of the Tri-County (Coos and Curry in Oregon and Del Norte, Calif.) chamber of commerce. He stated that owing to the location of Reedsport on the Coast highway this city was asked to affiliate and that he was of the opinion that it could gain considerable prestige and benefit by so doing. Upon motion the chamber voted to accept membership.

The president stated that he would withhold the appointment of committee chairmen until the 1945 membership was assured in order to know who would be eligible for service.
