YOU'RE A COMMITTEE MEMBER

ORGANIZATION of a new salvage committee to set up large scale collections of war-essential waste materials has been started in Douglas county. We have been lagging behind other counties of western Oregon in this important war effort, largely because we have attempted to make a one-man job out of salvage work instead of adopting the practice of appointing every resident of the county a committee of one to help with the task.

The county court has now appointed several persons to act as an executive salvage body in formulation of plans and details. But it is proposed to enlist the active leadership of hundreds of men and women throughout the county and to endeavor to obtain 100 per cent cooperation from every individual.

Therefore, YOU should consider yourself a member of this new salvage committee. You should hold yourself responsible for collection of all waste paper and tin from your own household, and from any other possible source; charged also with responsibility for delivery in compliance with collection arrangements to be announced at a later date.

There are altogether too many people who are letting others do their war work for them. After all we're in this thing together. The boys who are fighting overseas aren't just fighting for the Joneses and the Smiths. They are fighting as well for the Murphys and the Cohens and every last one of us. No one individual is any less responsible for proper conduct on the home front than any other person. Our duty is to do any and every job, regardless of how large or how small, which we can find to do.

During our last tin salvage campaign some people dumped old shoes and garbage into the boxes with cans. When we collected waste paper, it was found that many people failed to tie the bundles securely and, in fact, some made no effort whatever to cooperate.

Yet the war is being waged just as earnestly for the uncooperative as for the cooperative.

We can't have complete success in any war effort unless everyone who can contribute something does his bit.

Certainly it is not asking too much of anyone to request that he save waste paper, used fats and tin cans. These materials are vital to successful progress of the war.

Nor is it asking too much to request that he segregate waste paper—newspapers, magazines, cardboard—and tie SECURELY, so that those who do the HARD work in handling, transporting and loading supplies will not have extra labor to perform.

Tin cans should be washed, labels removed, ends cut out and the barrels flattened. They should be packed in strong containers. Don't use an old broken down carton that will collapse the moment it is picked up.

Keep paper and cans at your home or place of business until instructions are given as to when and where they are to be placed for collection. Then see that they are in the proper place at the assigned time. In every previous collection people have delivered their paper or cans for days after collection had been completed. As no warehouse space was available, the delayed receipts posed a difficult problem.

Your waste fats can be delivered at any time to your meat dealer or grocer, who will give you ration points in return. The need for waste fats is growing steadily more critical, so don't overlook this little chore.

And above all, don't forget you're a member of the salvage committee. GET BUSY!

Men Purchase More Cosmetics Despite Tax

KANSAS CITY, Jan. 23. (AP)—The demand for men's cosmetics is increasing tremendously. Fred D. Jones, vice president of the Cosmetic club, said here yesterday. Cologne water, face powder, men's talcum, shaving lotions, hair dressings, deodorants all for men—are booming in the cosmetic industry, which in 1943 sold about 600 million dollars' worth of beauty products. Jones said the 1944 figures would show an increase of at least 20 per cent, with little or no effect on the business.

New Waterways Program Calls for Half Billion

WASHINGTON, Jan. 23. (AP)—A new rivers and harbors bill was approved today by the senate commerce committee. Similar legislation rejected by congress last year, the bill calls for postwar navigation, hydro-electric power and irrigation works to cost nearly \$500,000,000. The committee eliminated a provision authorizing the secretary of the interior to dispose of surplus electricity from government projects by constructing transmission lines if necessary.

Survivor of Civil War Admits "Error" on Age

PORTLAND, Jan. 23. (AP)—Oregon's last surviving Civil War soldier, Theodore A. Penland, has had another birthday but it turned out to be only his 96th, not the 100th as guests had anticipated. Penland told 300 guests at his birthday party here last night that his age had been calculated wrong in recent years and that examination of musty army records showed he is only 96. The mistake was partly due to his eagerness to get into the Civil War when he was under age. Penland, commander of the Oregon department, Grand Army of the Republic, predicted the present war soon will end "the way we're destroying their cities and men and arms."

Women Cry When Laid Off From Shipyard Jobs

VANCOUVER, Wash., Jan. 23. (AP)—Women workers laid off at the Kaiser Vancouver shipyard left their jobs in tears yesterday protesting they wanted to remain at work. Carl Kilgore, personnel manager, said 200 employees were released due to reorganization of the time office and "overloads" in other divisions. The U. S. employment service said they could be employed in other essential industries.
