Blood Plasma Talk Given to Kiwanis By Drug Co. Agent

Medical research is being conducted on a very large scale in an effort to find a substance which may be substituted for blood plasma to reduce the expense to civilians, Thomas Young, representative of Eli Lilly and company, one of the nation's largest drug firms, told members of the Roseburg Kiwanis club at its regular Tuesday luncheon meeting.

Mr. Young told of the method used in preparing blood plasma and presented a flask for inspection by the club members. Whole blood now is being secured through the blood donors' service and is being processed at cost for the armed services, he reported. As a result there has been a great reduction in the number of fatalities among wounded men, as compared with previous wars.

He traced the history of blood transfusions, recounting how the first transfusions on record were made in the year 1640. The first detailed medical report of a successful transfusion was in 1834, Young said. But it was not until recent years, when researchers discovered methods of typing blood, that transfusions of whole blood became generally successful.

He explained the uses of both whole blood and plasma, showing how the latter controls shock. During the war, with donors giving their blood without charge, the cost of transfusions and blood plasma remains high in treating civilian patients, he said. After the war, unless blood donor service is maintained, the cost will increase, due to the necessity of paying professional donors.

Research, however, is making good progress in searching for substitutes for plasma, and it is believed a substance eventually will be found which will produce equally good results and at moderate cost.

His address featured the 30th anniversary meeting of Kiwanis International, the local club celebrating the occasion by the reading of a message from the international president.

OSC Basketeers Hand Huskies First Defeat of Season

CORVALLIS, Ore., Jan. 24.—(AP)—Ephrum Rocha, the flash from Hawaii, saturated the basket with 27 points last night to conduct Oregon State's Beavers to their most satisfying victory to date in the northern division, Pacific Coast conference hoop season—a 57 to 43 triumph over the University of Washington's defending titlists.

It was the first conference loss for the Huskies in five starts and failed to dislodge them from the pace position, but weakened their hold on the top spot to a point where another loss to Oregon State tonight would skid them into second, a half-game back of Oregon's Webbet.

The Beavers, with three wins and three losses, remained in third spot and will stay there regardless of the outcome tonight, but another victory would put them just one full game away from the leaders.

After tonight's fracas Washington rests a day, then switches to Eugene for a double session Friday and Saturday nights with Oregon, Idaho and Washington State, current tail-enders, also clash at the week's end.
