3. Enrollment of members.
4. Action upon any other matters which may be brought before the meeting.

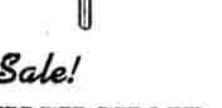

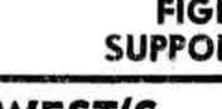
