

"Work-or-Fight" May Be Slain by Bitter Dispute

WASHINGTON, Jan. 30—(AP)—Moving to head off a floor fight, the house labor committee decided today to expedite action on legislation setting up the fair employment practices committee as a permanent agency.

A ten-man sub-committee headed by Rep. Randolph was directed to meet Thursday and consider ten separate FEPC bills. The full committee, Chairman Norton announced, will meet Friday to consider the sub-committee's recommendations.

The FEPC has been injected into manpower legislation on which the house began its second day of debate today, and a fight between FEPC backers and a bloc attempting to write strong labor curbs into the pending bill has threatened to kill the entire manpower measure.

Reflecting the view of the southern bloc, Representative Cox (D-Ga.), assailed the measure as "a pretense and an illusion" and called for a strengthening of its work-fight-or-be-jailed provisions.

A weekend of overtures and sounding out of sentiment failed to uncover a common ground for compromise of deep-seated differences between organized labor advocates and a bloc seeking to impose stringent curbs on union activities.

May Predicts Passage
"We will fight it out on the floor and I believe we have enough votes to win," Chairman May of the house military committee said today of the bill as a whole. The committee wrote the measure at the request of President Roosevelt.

May said he would resist attempts to write into the bill a ban against requiring a man to join a union if his local draft board assigns him to work in a closed shop.

The measure provides that men between 18 and 45 may not leave essential jobs without draft board approval and must take such jobs at draft board request under penalty of induction, fine or imprisonment.

Ban On Strikes Sought
A provision requiring boards to give men a "reasonable choice" of jobs, May said, adequately protects the freedom of a worker to join or refrain from joining a union.

This provision, however, does not meet the approval of a large bloc of southern democrats and rural republican representatives. They may seek to impose an outright ban on strikes and permit non-union men to work in closed shops.

In a letter to all house members, AFL President William Green called for defeat of the pending bill, contending it is contradictory to the fighting to stamp out totalitarianism abroad "while at the same time through the enactment of legislation we impose it upon free labor here at home."

He recommended that the war manpower commission, rather than selective service, be given authority to administer any new manpower control.
