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Legislation Aims To Curb Gambling On Athletic Bills

BROOKLYN, Feb. 1—(AP)—With New York state's legislature lending a legal hand, as far as the Empire state is concerned, basketball officials and other interested sportsmen throughout the nation today renewed their efforts to stamp out widespread gambling on games which one source estimated ran as high as \$10,000,000 weekly.

While a Kings county grand jury returned yesterday conspiracy indictment against two men charged with bribing five Brooklyn college basketball players, the state legislature received two bills directly connected with gambling on sports contests.

Assemblyman Malcolm Wilson introduced a bill to amend the penal law which would make amateur athletes liable to fines up to \$1,000 and imprisonment for one to five years. The present law applies only to professionals.

Also introduced in the legislature was a bill amending the penal code to make the offering of a bribe to an amateur athlete

a felony, instead of a misdemeanor. A person found guilty of a felony is subject to 10 to 20 years imprisonment, whereas a misdemeanor is punishable by only one to two years.

Accused in the Kings county grand jury indictment were Harvey Stemmer and Henry Rosen, confessed bookmakers, who were charged with conspiring to "defraud the public" by bribing five Brooklyn college players to throw a game against Akron university of Ohio, scheduled at Boston last night. The game was cancelled.

No charges were placed against the Brooklyn players, although they were named in the indictment as co-conspirators and will appear as witnesses when the case comes up.

Although lacking jurisdiction unless interstate traffic is involved, The F. B. I. is understood, has been quietly investigating gambling on amateur sports for several months.

BALANCED FEEDS and BALANCED BUYING

Everybody who is raising good turkeys and chickens these days knows the importance of balanced rations. And practices using them. It is a bit "MUST" in the business of raising good stuff or getting lots of milk, wool, pork, etc.

But some of you good growers may not understand one of our problems, that of balanced buying and selling. You can help us.

During a good part of the past year The Douglas County Flour Mill happened to be about the ONLY company using corn in both scratch and mash. The result was a great many people who use other brands of feed than Umpqua or Sunrise developed the habit of coming down to the Mill and getting their scratch, because they could get corn that way, and no other.

The result was that we ran out of corn for a few weeks between the old and the new crops, and our regular and loyal customers were put back in the same class as customers of other companies. We don't want that to happen again this year. We don't think it will, as it looks as if ingredients of all kinds would be available, except for temporary shortages due to transportation problems.

But to make it just a little more certain that it won't happen, we plan to make it a RULE to have NO EXCLUSIVE SCRATCH CUSTOMERS. It isn't good business for you to feed ONLY SCRATCH. Neither is it good business for us to sell ONLY SCRATCH. Balanced rations, balanced buying and selling. Get the idea?

SHEEP CUBES

Well, you know what the weather has been the last couple weeks. And you know the grass has stood as still as the thermometer. And that it takes a little time for it to start again after a lot of freezing weather.

It all adds up to the fact that if you are going to have lots of good lambs and heavy fleeces, it is high time you gave those ewes some Umpqua Sheep Cubes. Frozen, soft grass just doesn't produce fat lambs next spring.

In talking to lots of good sheep men, we find that those who sell the highest percentage of fat lambs are the ones who feed well. And under these war-time conditions, you know how it is.
