MRS. L. A. BANKS GIVES FIRST TALK TO STEADFAST CLASS

On the afternoon of January 25th the Steadfast class of the Presbyterian church held their regular monthly meeting. Mrs. W. M. Campbell is the teacher and for that day the class invited Mrs. Louis Albert Banks to talk to them on the subject of Mohammedanism. After a sumptuous dinner enjoyed by the four members of the class and a few out of town guests Mrs. Banks took up the study of the present world conditions in Mohammedanism, telling how the chief hope of one man of every eight in the world today is to go to Mecca once in his life; and of how the study of the foreign religions helps one to realize the importance of obeying Christ's charge "Go ye into all the world and preach the gospel to every creature."

The ancestry of Mohammed was traced back through Kedar of the Bible, second son of Ishmael, son of Abraham by the Egyptian bondwoman Hagar. Why Ishmael is called the father of the Bedouins and of the Arabs was clearly shown. The talk was beautifully illustrated by more than forty pictures of Mohammedan life, most of which were in color, including a lovely print of the Kaaba at Mecca, hub of Mohammedanism, housing the black rock toward which every Mohammedan prays five times a day; also of the Dome of the Rock at Jerusalem where Mohammedanism claims "Abraham offered up Ishmael," and of the Taj Mahal at Agra, India, on the walls of which is the entire Koran in costly mosaics.

Mrs. Banks also showed a large, charted volume of the Koran and quite a number of interesting and instructive articles from the Mohammedan life in foreign lands.

The class enjoyed the presentation of this illustrated talk, and Mrs. Banks reminded them that the well-known traveler, missionary, and writer, Stanley Jones, maintains that had Christians done their duty in carrying the gospel to Oriental lands, the history of the Pacific would have been different.

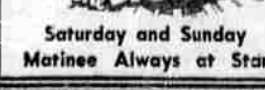
