Douglas Becomes Leading County in Sheep Production

Statistics showing the much larger reduction in sheep numbers in Oregon in recent years compared with other western states and with the country as a whole proved to be sobering facts when presented by H. A. Lindgren, extension livestock specialist, at the annual meeting of the Oregon Wool Growers association in Prineville.

Records going back to 1867 showed that the total of sheep and lambs now is at the lowest point since 1880. The number of sheep and lambs on Oregon farms January 1, 1944, is estimated at 1,217,000 head, was 16 per cent fewer than the number a year earlier, and 41 per cent below the 1935-1939 average.

Leaders of the association blame high production costs in the range sheep industry and inability to get enough competent herders at any price for the fact that the reduction in sheep numbers in eastern Oregon has been 67 per cent, while a 2 per cent increase was shown in western Oregon where farm flocks under fence predominate.

In 1940, eastern Oregon had 76 per cent of the total sheep in the state, but four years later the proportion had dropped to 65 per cent, as Douglas county became the leading county in the state in total sheep numbers. Malheur, Umatilla, Morrow, and Lake counties all topped the Douglas total of 103,000 in 1940. Four years later, however, Douglas had increased to 110,000, compared with Umatilla and Malheur county's 85,000 each, Morrow's 80,000, and Lake's 75,000.
