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W. A. Burr Funeral Held in California

Funeral services were held at 10:30 a. m. last Saturday at Santa Ana, Calif., for W. A. Burr, until recently a resident of Roseburg.

Mr. Burr, who was born in Clinton, Ill., March 12, 1869, and who was married there in 1893 to Capitola Maiden, came to Roseburg in 1900. He conducted a music store until 1909, and from 1910 to 1916 was engaged in farming at Diskoville. He then bought the Ford agency, which he sold to C. A. Lockwood in 1920, retiring at that time to a farm on the Curry estate, where he resided until three years ago.

Surviving are his wife, three sons and a daughter, Harry W. Burr, Homedale, Ida; Mrs. J. W. (May) Smith, San Gabriel, Calif.; T. E. Burr, Roseburg, and W. A. Burr, Jr., Glendale.

Proposed Diversion Up To Will of River Folk

SACRAMENTO, Calif., Feb. 6. (AP)—There will be no diversion of the Klamath river waters into other watersheds, if the people of the affected area are opposed, Major General Thomas M. Robbins told members of a legislative committee at an informal conference yesterday.

Robbins, deputy chief of the U. S. army corps of engineers, said the reinvestigation of the Klamath river proposal had been authorized by congress in 1937. He was quoted as saying "the will of the people will prevail in arriving at any decision, and if the people oppose diversion there will be no diversion."

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Oregon Man's Acquittal In Murder Case Asked

FAIRMONT, W. Va., Feb. 6. (AP)—Defense counsel asked today for a directed verdict of acquittal for Benjamin Franklin Male, 73, on trial for the 40-year-old slaying of a school teacher, on grounds that the prosecutor's case contained numerous flaws.

The request was made just after the state rested in piecing together the fatal wounding of Walter O. Smith on November 16, 1905, after a fight over the whipping of one of Male's children.

Attorneys for Male, who returned voluntarily for trial after spending 40 years in Oregon, argued that the state had failed to prove that Smith died of a blow from a mattock, or that anyone had actually pointed out the elderly defendant was the man who struck the blow.
