Schneider, who was awarded the Purple Heart for wounds received in action in Parroy forest, France, Sept. 30, was discharged Dec. 30 from an army hospital in Italy and was sent to a rest camp, according to his wife, Dorothy Schneider, Roseburg. His letter reported that he expects to be sent back to France for further treatment. He holds three awards of the bronze star and the expert infantryman badge. He served with Patton's army in the campaign in France.
