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Roseburg Gunner Helps to Destroy Jap Floatplane

L. E. Jones, Jr., aviation ordnanceman first class, U. S. N., of Route 1, Roseburg, turret gunner in a navy Ventura search plane, helped to destroy a Japanese floatplane during an air encounter on patrol off the coast of Mindoro in the Philippines.

The squadron of which Jones was a member had the mission of flying long searches deep into Japanese-held territory, ferreting out information about enemy shipping and other movements, and destroying the Japs' own system of air patrols.

The Jap, a Jake seaplane, was first sighted 10 miles off. The pilot of the Ventura, Lieutenant Commander Charles R. Dods, U. S. N., of Randall house, Annapolis, Maryland, speeded up the fast Lockheed search plane and drew up within gun range without being discovered. A burst from the Ventura's bow guns, which blew pieces off the Jake's tail and fuselage, was the first warning the Jap pilot had of his danger.

With scraps of metal from the Jake narrowly missing the Ventura, Dods streaked past the Jap plane and gave Jones an opportunity to fire a burst into the Jap from his turret guns.

Damaged, the Jake made a safe landing on the calm sea, but Dods brought the Ventura close overhead again, and another burst from the bow guns left the enemy plane flaming, with a pillar of smoke rising 1000 feet.

Mott Predicts More U. S. Highway Aid for Oregon

SALEM, Ore., Feb. 10.—(AP)—Rep. James W. Mott, visiting here yesterday, predicted that congress would approve a bill giving Oregon and other states substantial supplementary allocations of federal funds for postwar highway construction.

Under the recent postwar highway bill, Oregon would have \$12,000,000 available for road construction during the first three years after the war, but Mott said this isn't enough.

"Conchies" Appeal to Halt Weber's Penalty

LAPINE, Ore., Feb. 10.—(AP)—An appeal to halt the "cruel and unjust" sentence given Pvt. Henry Weber by army court-martial for refusing to drill was on route to President Roosevelt today from 50 inmates of a con-

scientious objectors' camp here. The signed petition originally opposed the death sentence ordered for the Vancouver, Wash., soldier but it was altered to term the substituted life imprisonment too severe.

The letter said other men have refused to bear arms after induction, as Weber did, and are in conscientious objectors' camps. Weber, sentenced at Camp Roberts, Calif., claims that he consistently told his draft board and induction officials that his beliefs would not permit him to kill.

War Widows Two Sisters Wedded to Brothers

HILTON, N. Y., Feb. 10.—(AP)—Two sisters wedded to brothers have been widowed by the war. PFC William F. Moran, 31, husband of the former Martha Reed, was killed in action in Bel-

gium last Jan. 24. Moran's brother, Pvt. Eugene Moran, 27, husband of Martha's twin, Emma, was killed in a glider crash in the same area last Sept.

LYNCHING OUTMODED — PORTLAND, Ore., Feb. 10.—(AP)—It may sound outmoded but Rudolph Barta, 19, has been sentenced to 370 days in the county jail in Portland for taking a horse without consent of the owner.

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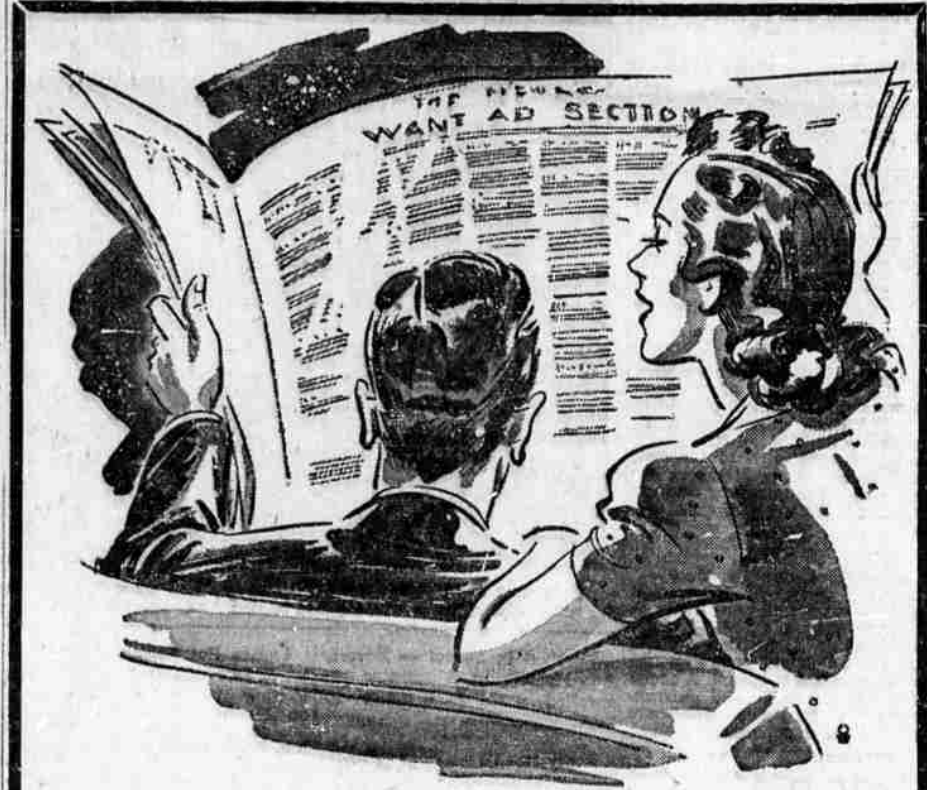
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
