Jap Snipers Still Hunted on Guam

U. S. PACIFIC FLEET HEADQUARTERS, Guam, Feb. 14.—(AP)—Marine and army patrols—sometimes armed with guns and sometimes with loud speakers—are clearing out the last few hundred Japanese from this island which Fleet Adm. Nimitz announced today as his advance headquarters.

At this headquarters "you can get a sniper bullet from almost any area of the island," said Col. Shelton C. Zern, operations officer for the island commandant, Marine Maj. Gen. Henry Larsen. Some Japanese on Guam are in good health and well adjusted to jungle-hiding. Others are emaciated.

"Most of them are scantily armed," said Zern—"sometimes one rifle to four or five men."

The ammunition comes from supplies buried here and there before the American invasion.

As Admiral Nimitz issued his communique today telling of the 8th consecutive day's raid on two Jima, enemy airbase in the Volcano islands, 750 miles south of Tokyo, prisoners were still being taken.

Nazi Operations Indicate Plan to Quit North Italy

ROME, Feb. 14.—(AP)—The entire Italian front subsided into minor patrol clashes and artillery duels today, with the Germans probing more actively at allied lines.

Meanwhile, the allied command's reports noted a number of conditions under which an enemy withdrawal from northern Italy could be undertaken.

Fifth army headquarters said the enemy was laying down smoke-screens south of Bologna, "possibly to shield movement, digging parties and the laying of mines." The Germans in the past week dynamited gans in the Senio river's flood banks forming a water barrier behind which a withdrawal could be effected easily.

Minefields—another barrier effective against close pursuit—have been sown freely by the Germans in the past week along the Tyrrhenian coast and in other sectors.

More than 500 fighter-escorted heavy bombers of the U. S. 15th air force attacked railway yards in the Vienna and Graz areas of Austria and Maribor, Yugoslavia, yesterday.

Fifteen allied planes were lost from the day's operations, which included renewed attacks on the Brenner pass.

Roosevelt Names Delegates to Meet Of United Nations

WASHINGTON, Feb. 14.—(AP)—Congress found itself in a position today to exercise an early and possibly decisive voice about American participation in a projected world security organization.

Four legislators were designated by President Roosevelt as members of a delegation of eight to attend the San Francisco United Nations conference opening April 25.

These four apparently have it in their combined power to veto at the outset any arrangements they believe might stall senate approval of a forthcoming treaty setting up a world league to keep down future aggression.

There is every reason to believe that President Roosevelt had this thought in mind when he chose them as members of a group headed by Secretary of State Stettinius. They are Chairman Connally (D., Tex.) and Senator Vandenberg (R., Mich.) of the house and senate foreign relations committees and Chairman Bloom (D., N. Y.) and Rep. Eaton (R., N. J.) of the house foreign affairs committee.

All four worked closely in the past with former Secretary of State Hull on preliminary plans for international peace cooperation.

Stassen Gets Recognition. For the other two members, Mr. Roosevelt picked Lt. Comdr. Harold E. Stassen, former republican governor of Minnesota, and Dean Virginia Gildersleeve of Barnard college.

Legislators immediately interpreted the choice of Stassen as a presidential recognition of the so-called "one-world" wing of the republican party that was represented primarily by the late Wendell L. Willkie, subsequently by Stassen and Senator Ball (R., Minn.).

Stassen, who originally appointed Ball to the senate, is author of a world organization plan which, in effect, calls for creation of a super government to police the peace.

Vandenberg recently heartened the administration in a senate speech endorsing the principle of international collaboration along the lines laid down at the Dumbarton Oaks preliminary conference.

Eaton joined with Vandenberg and other republicans at Mackinac island months ago in pledging their party to cooperative organization with other nations to prevent future aggression.

Poultry Problems To be Discussed At Meeting Here

Poultry and turkey growers will have an opportunity to discuss production and disease control problems with OSC specialists Monday and Tuesday, February 19 and 20 at the K. of P. hall in Roseburg. Meetings on both days will start promptly at 10 o'clock and close at 3 p. m.

Dr. E. M. Dickerson, poultry veterinarian, will discuss disease problems and sanitation. N. L. Bennion, extension poultryman, will cover production trends, supply prices, management and feeding problems.

The meetings are in the nature of a school for all poultry and turkey producers of the county. Similar meetings have been held annually in past years, states County Agent J. Roland Parker, to keep producers posted on the latest developments in each industry. Both industries during the past year passed the million dollar mark in gross returns to farmers of the county. Over 200,000 turkeys were produced and marketed in 1944, with an equal number of laying hens being kept for hatching eggs and commercial egg production.
