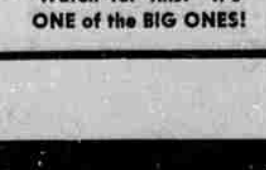

Fire Boat Soon in Reedsport Service

REEDSPORT—The Reedsport fire department soon will have a well equipped fire boat ready for service on the Umpqua river as a result of the ingenuity and persuasive ability of Maurice M. Kelly, fire department chief. Chief Kelly has arranged with the Umpqua River Navigation company, of which O. H. Hinsdale of the Gardiner Lumber company is the owner, to equip the company's tugboat, Junco, with a turret nozzle for fighting fire along the water front. The tug is equipped with a pump capable of handling 750 gallons of water per minute. It is operated by Captain Marshall Leach, and has previously been pressed into service on water front fires, but has lacked equipment to be fully effective. Through use of a revolving turret nozzle, with which the boat is to be equipped, two men can operate the fire boat. The expense of equipment and installation, according to Chief Kelly's plan, will be shared by mills, dock owners and others having water front property in the Reedsport area. Winchester Bay and other districts along the river as far upstream as Scottsburg.

Striking Welders Face Draft Threat

SEATTLE, Feb. 15.—(AP)—The draft, looming as a real threat to some striking shipyard welders, will "have to take its course," Henry A. Doty, president of the strikers' independent union, said today. Production at the two affected plants, the Todd Pacific shipyards and the Reedsport docks, was crippled further when more employees were laid off because the lack of welders slowed up work, company spokesmen said. The strike started Friday. "The draft board will just have to follow their regulations," Doty told newsmen. "We can't help men any on this draft business." Today was the deadline for the welders to turn over to selective service boards names of men off their jobs five days. John D. Hayes, Todd-Pacific general manager, said steps to notify boards of welders involved would be taken today. The yard reported that 400 workers in other crafts have been kept idle through the jurisdictional dispute between the United Brotherhood of Welders, Cutters and Helpers (Ind.) and the A. F. L. welders union.

Kiwanis Sponsors Mat Card to Aid Polio Fund

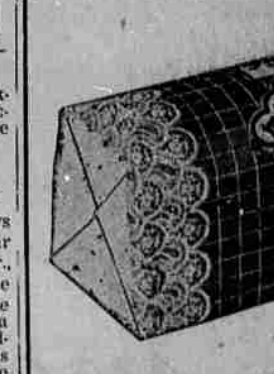

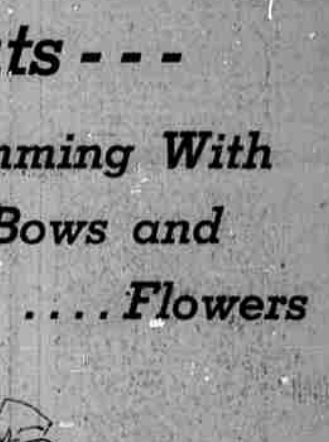
