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Social Security Agent Sets Visit Broadcast Here

Charles H. Cannon, manager of the Social Security board in this area, will visit Roseburg on Tuesday, February 20. He will be at the U. S. employment office, located in the courthouse from 1 p. m. until 5 p. m. On Monday, the 19th, Mrs. Cannon will speak on social security, over radio station KORE, at 4:15 p. m. Tuesday night, Mr. Cannon will address the Fraternal Order of Eagles, following their business meeting at 8 p. m.

Changes in the administration of the social security act will not permit the recomputation of benefits, Cannon states. This means that men who attained 65 in 1940 and 1941 and filed claims on the wages they had earned up to that time had frozen their benefits at the time they filed the claim. Since 1941 many of these men have been re-employed at much higher wages than before. This may tend to increase their benefits by increasing their average monthly wage. Workers in this class are urged to contact Mr. Cannon during his visit here, or to write to the Eugene field office, Post Office Building, Eugene.

Supply of Copper Wire Facing Reduction

Copper wire supplies for farm and other civilian use are expected to be materially reduced during the next few months and farmers may even experience difficulty in purchasing copper wire with certificates. Decreases in the amount of free copper wire available have increased the demand by farmers for certificates, while the WFA allotment of copper wire for the first quarter of 1945 is the smallest allocation for this purpose since the program began and less than was used in the last quarter of 1944. Unless military requirements decrease, the second quarter WFA allocation will be no higher.
