Mr. Snyder was introduced by Dr. Morris H. Roach and he gave an account of the seizure of the hospital at Canton by the Japanese on Dec. 7, 1942, and of his work there under their direction. He gave many interesting incidents of the experiences which he and his family encountered in a concentration camp in China, prior to their repatriation on the Gripsholm.

ENSEMBLE TO BE HEARD BY ASSOCIATION FEB. 23

Members of the Roseburg Community Concert association are anticipating with the greatest of pleasure its next concert featuring the Bary Ensemble, which appears at the Junior high school next Friday evening, Feb. 23, at 8:15 o'clock. This group—piano, flute, violin and cello—meets a widespread demand for a musical ensemble offering programs of the finest concerted music, combined with solo numbers.

These artists are particularly adapted to this type of program, because not only are they experienced in ensemble work but each is an outstanding soloist in her own right.

The ensemble was formed by Gertrude Bary, pianist, and artist of extensive background here and abroad. Miss Bary organized the group as a musical adventure—she wanted to get away from the conventional pattern of chamber music units. True, there were few scores written for piano, flute, violin and cello. But the members of the Bary Ensemble, all highly trained musicians, have solved that difficulty by making their own arrangements.

Miss Bary's tours of Europe and the United States have included appearances in recital, ensemble and as soloist with orchestra. New York has heard her in recital and with noted groups and she has broadcast over such major stations as WJZ, WEA and WQXR.

Lora Wren has appeared as soloist and flutist with the Orchestre Classique and the New York Oratorio society under Albert Stoessel's direction. For several years she was first flutist with Phil Spitalny's famous all-girl orchestra on the National Broadcasting company. She has toured with many well known artists in recital. Miss Wren comes from California and she studied with Georges Barrere at the Juillard school of music and John Wurmmer of New York Philharmonic orchestra.

The group's violinist, Mary Becker, began her professional career at fourteen, made five transcontinental concert tours before making her New York debut in Town Hall recital. Born in Syracuse, she started to study violin with her mother in early childhood. When she was ten she had her first lesson from her father, the late Prof. Conrad L. Becker.

head of the violin department of the college of Fine Arts of Syracuse University, and a pupil of Joachim. She completed the four year course at Syracuse University in the unprecedented time of twelve months and followed this up by winning prizes and scholarships, including the Harrison award of \$1000 and a six-year fellowship at the Juillard graduate school, where she studied with Albert Spalding and the late Paul Kochanski.

Virginia Peterson, "cellist," held a scholarship for several years with Michel Penha in San Francisco. From there she went to London to continue her studies with Ivor James. Returning to this country, she worked with Alfred Wallenstein and the late Emanuel Feuermann. Among these was the Manhattan Trio, whose most recent tour covered thirteen states. Miss Peterson has been soloist a number of times with the New York City Symphony orchestra.
