The defendant claims he did not buy the supplies for his own use, but that they were purchased by an operator to whom he had contracted a fleet of trucks and that he made diligent effort to aid the oil company in collecting the alleged bill.

Judge G. F. Skipworth was called upon by Eugene to conduct the trial.

Parents Hear From Son, Prisoner of Japanese

Mr. and Mrs. E. A. Crow, Lookingglass route, Roseburg, have received the first direct communication from their son, Eldon A. Crow, who was made a prisoner of war when Wake Island was captured by the Japanese. They had previously been notified of his capture, but had received no letter. In a letter postmarked September 25, 1943, he reported he had written several letters, but none has been received by the parents. First taken to Shanghai, he has since been removed to Kawasaki camp No. 5, near Tokyo.

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Olsen, Ross Win Rough Wrestling Bouts at Armory

Retaliating in kind for the vicious tactics of an opponent who outweighed him at least 10 pounds, rawhide-tough Milt Olsen, 175 pounds, rugged, gouged, kicked and partially wrestled his way to a victory over Buck Davidson in a two-fall grappling brawl at the armory last Saturday night. Olsen took both falls on combined leg stoppers and stamps, the first in 24 minutes and 12 seconds, the second in 23 minutes and 22 seconds.

In both hectic rounds the combatants struggled off the mat onto the floor in front of the first row railbirds. The melee drew nearly all of the 350 spectators to their feet—some of them even scrambling into the ring—and wild yells filled the arena while Referee Owen struggled with the gladiators to restore them to the mat and to some semblance of wrestling as prescribed in the book of rules.

The near riot began in the first round when Olsen, in response to Davidson's dirtiness, knocked his opponent down, kicked him through ropes and off the platform and then followed him to the floor with a fistful of barage. The men struggled off the mat and onto the floor in the second round, and shortly after they were put back on the canvas. Davidson knocked Olsen out of the ring. Olsen quickly returned and soon both men were again battling among the spectators. Olsen ended the bout with the deciding fall soon after the pair were put back on the mat.

In the opening bout of the card, Tony Ross won a three-fall battle with "Silent" Rattan. Tony, adhering to his reputation for foul tactics, took the first fall with a back breaker and body press in 11 minutes and 28 seconds, and the third in 5 minutes and 42 seconds with a crab hold. A series of shoulder butts gave Rattan the second fall in 6 minutes and 45 seconds.

Carte and Talley, two local youngsters, repeated their boxing bout of the previous week by staging a three-round bloodless draw in advance of the wrestling events.

The leaders face the season's climax with equal opposition. Oregon meets the University of Idaho at Eugene tomorrow and Wednesday and Oregon state takes on the Vandals at Corvallis Friday and Saturday. These games wind up the season for the Oregon clubs, barring the not faint possibility of a tie.

The Beavers face a tougher sledding in meeting Washington Friday and Saturday on the Huskies' home floor. W. S. C. took two from the U. of W. at Pullman, but this time Coach Edmundson can use his navy trainees. The series will be Washington's last. W. S. C. still has a pair to play with Idaho.

Oregon State's Red Rocha was held to two free losses Saturday night, but Larry West and Bob Labhart took over the scoring burden for the Beavers in a 45-43 victory.

With three minutes left, Oregon pulled into a 43-43 tie, but a lay-in by Strait put the Beavers back in front, 45-43. Neither club could count in the last two minutes.
