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Sutherlin Flier Given Air Medal

AN EIGHTH AIR FORCE BOMBER STATION, England—Sergeant Robert L. Wood, 19, of Sutherlin, Ore., bull turret gunner on an Eighth air force B-17 Flying Fortress, has been awarded the Air Medal for "meritorious achievement while participating in heavy bombardment missions in the air offensive against the enemy over Nazi Germany."

He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Lafayette A. Wood, Route 1, Sutherlin, Ore. A graduate of Wilson High school, St. Paul, Minn., he joined the AAF in August, 1943.

Sgt. Wood is a member of the 387th bomber group commanded by Colonel William K. Martin, of Ogden, Utah. The group is a unit of the Third air division, the division cited by the President for its now historic England-Africa shuttle bombing of the Messerschmitt airplane factories at Regensburg in southern Germany, August, 1943.

CAMAS VALLEY—Lieut. Neal Brown, who was wounded in a battle on the western front, has telegraphed his wife that he is now in an army hospital in Lynn, Mass., and hopes to be home soon. He has received the Purple Heart.

Leo Long who has been in the postal department in Italy since he was limited to restricted service after having been dismissed from the hospital, has been transferred to the M. P. division.

Word has been received here by relatives that Tech. Sgt. Bruce Ferguson has arrived safely some place in France. Before entering the service in November, 1943, he was at the Tiller ranger station, where he was employed for a number of years with the Umpqua National forest service. His wife and daughter are residing at Oregon City until his return.

Word has been received that PFC Perry L. Smith has received the Bronze Star medal for meritorious achievement in connection with military operations against the enemy at Leyte, Philippine islands, during the period of October 20 until December 20. Smith is with the 24th division field artillery and is a son of Mr. and Mrs. Perry Smith of Yoncalla.

Word has been received in Roseburg that Catherine Irving, S 2/c, is attending camera repair school at Pensacola, Fla.

Mr. and Mrs. Austin Wilson, Riddle, have received the Purple Heart medal recently awarded their son, Sergeant William P. Wilson, now in action in the south Pacific. Sergeant Wilson is a

member of Company D, 162nd Infantry, the Douglas county national guard company. He suffered shrapnel wounds in the leg June 9 while participating in the Biak campaign. He has since recovered and returned to active duty.

From headquarters of the Twelfth air force in Italy comes word that the B-25 Mitchell bombardment group, in which First Lieutenant Lewis E. Insley, Roseburg, is serving as a pilot, has been cited again by the War department as a distinguished unit, for the sinking of the Italian cruiser Taranto in La Spezia harbor, Sept. 23.
