Fingerlings Not To Be Freed Prior To Self-Care Stage

REEDSPORT—Howard Ru- ben, who has charge of the silver-side fish hatchery, operated by the state on Little Wells creek, east of this city, states that 1,150,000 silverside fingerlings now feeding there are in fine shape. He has been informed that they will not be released in April of this year, but will continue under the present feeding conditions for another year. Then they will be large and strong enough to care for themselves and will be able to reach salt water without being devoured by the larger fish.

Last April the fingerlings feeding in this hatchery were released. 200,000 of them were released. The dam there and a large number were thus lost in the Umpqua because of their inability to care for themselves; but quite a lot were saved and kept in the stream and became good fish. This hatchery has been partially rebuilt and is very serviceable institution. Without interference from outside sources and with the cooperation of the citizens and the fish commission, it will be of real producing value to both the commercial and sports fishermen.

Victory Garden Advice Offered By County Agent

Victory gardeners who have a choice of garden sites will get better results by choosing a level, or gently sloping, free working soil with not too much shade from buildings or competition from nearby trees, advises J. Roland Parker, county agent. Greater interest in victory gardening is expected than a year ago because world conditions have shown conclusively that home-grown vegetables will be vitally needed again this year.

How soon to work the garden plot will depend on the type of soil, states Mr. Parker. Sandy soils warm early in the spring and can be worked early, although they dry out more rapidly and may require more fertilizer. Heavier or clay types of soils are damaged by too early working, although some gardeners successfully crowd the season with a small portion of the plot worked for the very earliest vegetables.

There is danger of working heavy soils too wet. A simple test for proper dryness of clay soils for spading or plowing is to squeeze a sample of soil from the bottom of the furrow or spade depth into a ball. If the particles stick together the soil is too wet to work, but if they separate easily the garden may be spaded or plowed safely.

Organic matter from farm manures, compost and cover crops is an essential for good garden soils. Barnyard manure or compost is applied at the rate of 10 to 20 tons per acre, or in smaller terms, 100 pounds per square rod, or 50 pounds to each 100 square feet.

Ample supplies of victory garden fertilizer are available, with the 6-10-4 formula favored for most Oregon soils. This can be spread at the rate of one to one and a half pounds per 100 square feet before spading or plowing, in addition to side dressings made at planting time.

Liming garden soils in western Oregon is not usually as important as some think. Mr. Parker believes, though 14 pounds of hydrated lime per 100 square feet, or not to exceed 8 to 10 pounds of wood ashes per hundred square feet may be used. A common error is to use too much lime or wood ashes.

Paid Fines \$21,377 In Justice Court Here During 1944

Fines totalling \$21,377.55 were collected by Justice of the Peace Thomas C. Hartfield in the Deer Creek district court at Roseburg during the year 1944, according to Judge Hartfield's annual report. The court handled 1095 criminal cases and 157 civil cases for a total of 1252.

Of the sum of \$21,377.55 collected in fines, Douglas county received \$10,897.40, while \$4,972.50 went to the state of Oregon. The Justice of the peace is allowed \$200 per month from fees collected, and the Roseburg court paid excess fees amounting to \$2,449.35 to the county, which was in addition to the amount retained for salary.

In addition to collection of fines, the court committed 57 defendants to jail for non payment of fines. Thirty-five defendants were bound over to the grand jury and 34 juvenile delinquency arrests were remanded to the juvenile court.

Offenses Listed Overloaded trucks, 108; axle overloads, 114; no operator's license, 111; speeding, 103, were leading offenses.
