Draft Deferment Planned For 1,250,000 Men Holding Key Jobs in War Industries

WASHINGTON, Feb. 20.—(AP)—Instead of "a very limited number," as officially announced, approximately 1,250,000 men under 30 who hold key jobs in war industries stand to be deferred from the draft.

This became known today when an official of selective service acknowledged that the new program allows the deferment of 30 per cent of all registrants who were classified 2-A and 2-B as of Jan. 1.

Since 4,198,000 men were in the two classes, which cover deferments in occupations other than agriculture, government agencies will be allowed to pick out a total of roughly a million and a quarter of registrants for deferment. Because the draft is not taking war plant workers over 30, the 30 per cent of the total will be composed of those under 30.

Each of 15 agencies is allowed certification of a flat 30 per cent in their respective spheres of activity. Most of them, however, are dividing this into two equal parts. One 15 per cent is being delegated to the field, or offices outside Washington, and the other 15 per cent is being retained in Washington.

Canyonville Boy Decorated for War Duty in 5 Areas

Pvt. First Class Donald V. DeVore, son of Mr. and Mrs. J. B. DeVore of Canyonville, Oregon, has been serving overseas for more than 31 months. His outfit, an air force service squadron, has been in England, North Africa, and Corsica and has serviced and repaired aircraft for the air offensive in Europe, the Tunisian campaign, the Sicilian, Naples-Foggia and Rome-Arno campaigns. Thus, on his European-African-Middle Eastern campaign ribbon, Pfc. DeVore is entitled to wear a silver star signifying participation in five different campaigns. He also has been authorized to wear the good conduct medal.

As a truck driver with his squadron, PFC. DeVore performs the routine duties of settled camp life, such as driving the water truck or hauling the water materials needed for the camp or the repair and service shops. 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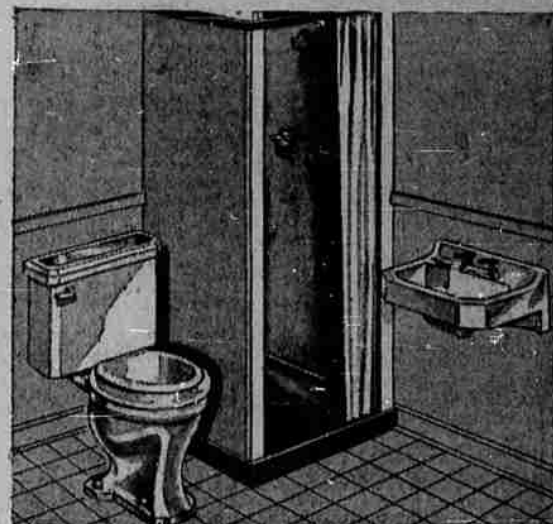

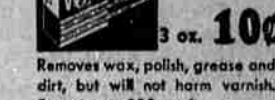

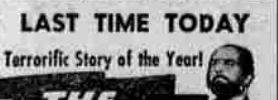
