BARY ENSEMBLE TO BE HEARD TONIGHT

The Bary Ensemble, which plays for the Roseburg Community Concert association tonight at 8:15 o'clock at the Junior high school auditorium, was formed by Gertrude Bary, distinguished pianist, as a musical adventure. Brought up in a musical family, Miss Bary knew the fellowship and artistic satisfaction that comes from group playing. Her career as a solo recitalist here and in Europe has been combined with appearances, with noted chamber music organizations.

When Gertrude Bary formed her own ensemble, she decided to get away from the conventional pattern of such units. The Bary Ensemble is an unusual group—piano (Miss Bary); flute (Lorna Wren); violin (Mary Beckler); and cello (Virginia Peterson). She believes that this combination, more than any other, offers each player an opportunity to produce her own qualities and at the same time merge with the others in a perfect tonal unity.

True, there were few scores written for piano, flute, violin and cello, but the members of the Bary Ensemble, all highly trained musicians, have solved that difficulty by making their own arrangements.

Another departure from the customary by the Bary Ensemble is that their program is not made up entirely of concerted numbers. Each member is an outstanding soloist in her own right and contributes a solo group.

Miss Bary says that the prime purpose of the ensemble is of course to present fine music as soloists and jointly. But she confesses to a secondary motive—remembering how much she enjoyed playing music with her family, she hopes that the Bary Ensemble programs may give the audiences the idea of forming music groups. In these days of gas and tire rationing, when everyone must seek much entertainment at home and in immediate neighborhoods, Miss Bary believes community music of all kinds will be revived.

Jack Kiser, the Pacific coast light-heavyweight champion who has become an outstanding local favorite among wrestling followers, will appear here at the armory Saturday night in the opening mat match of Don Owen's weekly grappling show. Kiser will meet Buck Davidson in a one-hour non-title engagement.

A technical decision was registered by Kiser here recently when he won over Tony Ross on a foul. The St. Johns Adonis, whose specialty is a sensational "skin-the-cat" hold, will be meeting another two-listed rival in Davidson. The ex-marine from Texas demonstrated his rough-and-tumble tactics here last week in a bout that had fans on the edge of their seats throughout the bout. Davidson lost in straight falls to Mill Olsen, but left no doubt in the mind of fans—or Olsen—regarding his ability to give and take.

Wagner vs. Johnson

Headlining the program will be a match between Gus Johnson and "Gorgeous George" Wagner. Johnson, who defeated Davidson here recently, will be meeting one of the most talented grapplers in the business.
