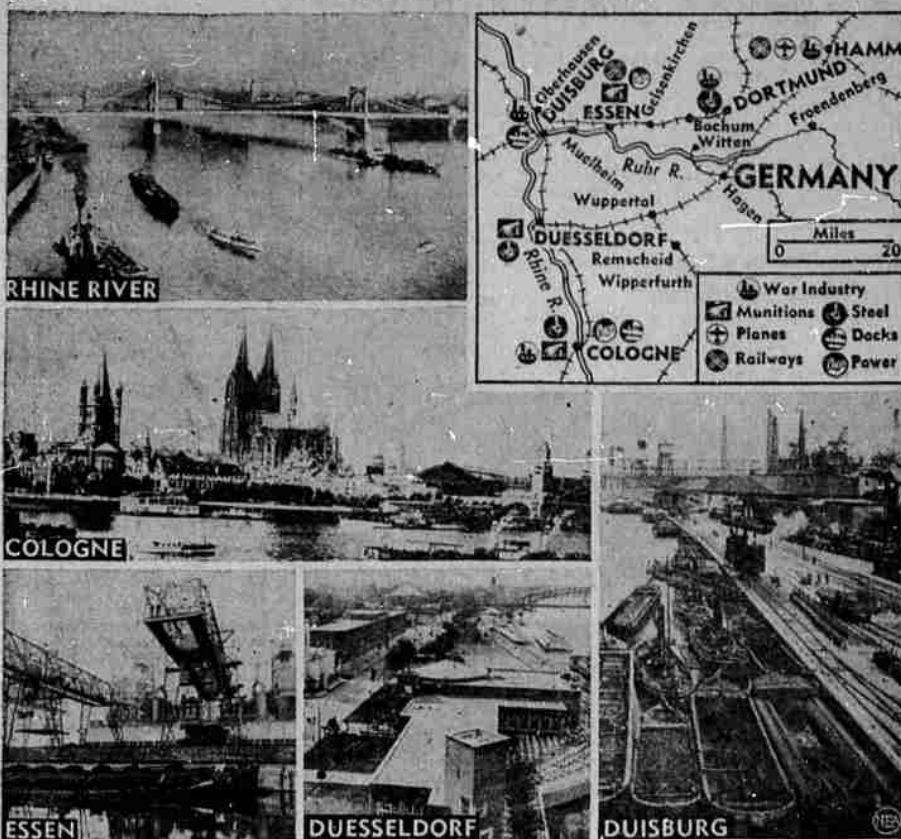

Safeway Denied Review Of OPA Regulations

WASHINGTON, Feb. 26.—(AP) The supreme court refused today to review protests by Safeway Stores, Inc., operators of retail food stores in 23 states, against several regulations issued by the price administrator.

The firm asked review of decisions by the emergency court of appeals which upheld the administrator's orders.

Safeway complained that a price rollback required by a regulation on meat was "imposed" only on large chain stores or organizations. Various percentage mark-ups established for determination of retail ceiling prices in many instances which varied to Safeway's detriment, the firm said.

Mrs. C. Frederick Of Myrtle Creek Passes On at 71

Mrs. Caroline Elizabeth Frederick, 71, well-known resident of Myrtle Creek, died at the Myrtle Creek hospital Sunday following a short illness. She was born at Visalia, Calif., Sept. 9, 1872, the daughter of William P. Hedgpeth, pioneer Californian, and Mary Brieley Hedgpeth, pioneer Oregon schoolteacher, who taught in the first school at Oregon City, Oregon. She later lived in Tulare county and at Fresno, Calif. She was married to Aaron W. Frederick at North Fork, Calif., March 11, 1900, and came to Myrtle Creek from that city in 1919. Mr. Frederick passed away in August, 1943. Mrs. Frederick was a member of the Methodist church.

Surviving are five children, Adam W. Frederick, Springfield, Oregon; Mrs. Mary E. Park, William, Oregon; John J. Frederick, Myrtle Creek, Oregon; Huey I. Frederick, Anchorage, Alaska; and Paul Frederick, Salem, Ore. She is also survived by a brother, Joel Hedgpeth of Walnut Creek, Calif., five grandchildren and two great grandchildren.

Funeral services will be held at the Methodist church in Myrtle Creek, Tuesday afternoon at 2 o'clock. Rev. James Wilkins, officiating. Concluding services and interment will follow in the Myrtle Creek L. O. O. F. cemetery. Arrangements are in charge of the Douglas Funeral home.
