Three-Month Toll of Jap Planes, Ships Enormous

WASHINGTON, Feb. 27.—(AP)—Carrier-based planes of the Third and Fifth fleets have destroyed 1,610 Japanese planes and sunk 187 enemy vessels of all types in operations since December 1.

A navy compilation announced today included the two recent strikes against Tokyo. In addition, a naval spokesman said, 1,078 enemy planes and 38 enemy ships were damaged at a cost of 178 American planes lost. There were no naval vessel combat losses in the operations covered.

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Start Now On Victory Gardens, Americans Urged

A. P. Newsfeatures Writer—Now is the time for all good Americans to go to their gardens and dig. Victory gardening no longer can be considered a hobby. It is "must" war production. That's the consensus of government food experts who ask for a united food growing and canning campaign this year to stave off critical civilian shortages. The goal is far beyond last year's record which provided over half of the fruit and vegetables consumed in American homes. In 1944, the Department of Agriculture estimates, there were 25 million victory gardeners. From their soil, in addition to an abundance of fresh supplies, these amateurs canned 34 million quarts of produce to carry them through a war winter. This production permitted the government almost to double "eat aside" processed foods for delivery to the armed forces, lend lease and aid to liberated countries.

War's Mounting Needs—This year—with the services still increasing, the draft absorbing more agricultural manpower and military advances bringing more devastated areas into Allied hands—even more food must be earmarked for government purposes. That's why peak victory garden production is vital.

It's going to be an easier year for the canner. Approved is the manufacture of some 500,000 water bath containers for processing fruits and tomatoes. In production are 630,000 steam pressure canners—an increase over last year's 400,000. The steam canners, now being made of aluminum again, are for non-acid vegetables. Both types will be on sale between March and July. At the nation's 6,000 community canning centers, more expected by summer, the novice gets expert advice.

Though the 1945 allotment of canning sugar is about the same as 1944's—700,000 tons—new rationing regulations are designed to make sure that those who actually can at home get their fair share of this sugar.

Canning Supplies Plentiful—Victory canners, the government says, will find an adequate number of jars, containers and metal lids on sale. Some 47,000 tin can sealers have been approved for manufacture, and many will go to community plants. Also available are commercial and community freezing lockers as well as dehydration equipment, some of which can be made at home. Salt brining for non-acid vegetables and certain underripe fruits such as pears and peaches also are expected to be widely used.

ters offers the novice these simple rules:

1. Plan well in advance.
2. Have everything ready at season's opening—seeds, fertilizers, insecticides and tools. Don't waste good weather in last minute shopping.
3. Plant early crops early, holding later crops, such as tomatoes and lima beans, until soil and weather are ready.
4. Feed crops with fertilizer and protect them from insects and disease with dusts or sprays of proved value.
5. Insure against drought with provisions for watering or irrigation, and with organic matter in the soil and mulches on the surface to hold moisture.

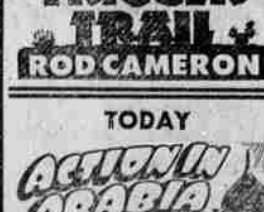
