FAMED SINGER TO BE HEARD IN CONCERT IN ROSEBURG MARCH 7TH

Alexander Kipnis, Metropolitan Opera star, will be presented by the Roseburg Community Concert association at the Junior High school auditorium Wednesday evening, March 7, at 8:15 o'clock. Members of the association only, with the exception of service men in uniform, will be privileged to attend the concert. Servicemen are always invited to attend as guests at any concert presented by the association.

Kipnis was born in Zeltomir, the Ukraine, South Russia, and is reported to have displayed his gifts and interest in music early in life. He sang in private concerts as a boy and entered the Conservatory of Warsaw, then under the direction of the Russian Empire, graduated with honors as conductor and went to Berlin for further study.

At the outbreak of World War I, Kipnis was interned in a civilian prison camp along with other enemy aliens while idly singing in the prison yard, heard by the German colonel in charge of the camp, who arranged for an audition with the director of the Wiesbaden State opera and the result was a five-year contract and the beginning of his operatic career.

Before the present war, Kipnis was star of the Wagner Festivals in Bayreuth, and later, of the Salzburg Mozart Festival. He was principal bass-baritone of the Vienna State Opera and appeared as guest star in leading opera cities including London, Buenos Aires and New York. He returned to New York as star of the Wagner Festival Singers and his success led to three long recital tours. In 1937-38 he met with sensational popularity in Vienna and Australia. During 1938-39, he presented a series of lecture recitals in New York and the following year made his debut at the Metropolitan Opera, where he is now known as one of the leading bass-baritones of all time.

Mr. Kipnis, his wife and young son, Igor, live in Westport, Conn. when he is free from concert recitals and opera performances.
