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Postwar Disposal Of Aluminum Units By U. S. Advocated

WASHINGTON, Feb. 27—(AP)—The government should dismantle, sell or lease the aluminum and magnesium plants it does not need after the war, a WPB official said today.

Dr. W. Y. Elliot, War Production board vice-chairman, told a special senate committee that "the less the government perpetuates itself in fields which can be adequately handled by private enterprise, the better it will be."

The committee began hearings to explore postwar opportunities for small business in the production and use of aluminum and magnesium. The government is now the largest owner of the light metal plants in the world. "Because I do not believe that aluminum and magnesium are in their nature a public utility, I am not recommending that they remain and operate any of these plants in competition with private business," Dr. Elliot said.

The government must either dismantle plants which it does not need for standby operation on security grounds, or it must dispose of them by sale to the highest bidder or by lease terms to responsible owners, he said. He suggested, however, that a government subsidy for a period after the war "will be expedient" to keep in balance "valuable productive segments of infant industries."

DDT, Insect Killer, Is Freed for Experiment

Producers of DDT, the war-developed insect killer, are now permitted to make direct distribution of limited amounts for

agricultural and other civilian experimentation, according to WPB. Formerly, requests for DDT for research work required application to WPB for individual allocations. Direct military uses have been taking the entire supply of DDT.

Pepco's Debt Wiped Out By Compromise Accord

PORTLAND, Feb. 27—(AP)—An estimated \$3,000,000 had been added to assets of the Portland Electric Power company today through compromise settlement of loans by Federal Special Master Estes Snedecor.

The settlement wipes out a

debt of well over \$5,000,000 borrowed by PEPCO from the Chase National bank of New York and Harris Trust and Savings company of Chicago. Independent trustees of the power company were authorized to transfer Consolidated Electric and Gas company stocks to the bank and PEPCO will deliver stocks and \$1,840,505 cash.
