Trial Set in Case Based on Charge Of Sect Member
Robert A. Smith, ex-marine, who is charged in the Roseburg justice court with assault and battery in a complaint filed by Z. E. Whitmore, member of the Jehovah's Witness sect, pleaded not guilty upon appearance in court Wednesday afternoon and will stand trial scheduled for 10 a. m. March 7.

Smith appeared voluntarily in court Wednesday afternoon and, according to Justice of the Peace Thomas Hartfiel, told the court he had struck another member of the sect.

When Smith came into Roseburg yesterday, according to information given the court members of the sect began following him and advising police of his whereabouts, demanding service of the warrant for his arrest.

Smith told the court Judge Hartfiel said, that one of the trailing members became insulting and that he struck him. Smith hunted up one of the city officers who directed him to the justice court, where the ex-marine, made his appearance and entered his plea.

He was released upon his own recognizance pending trial.
