

School Concert Boosts Fund For Band's Uniforms

A near capacity audience last night heard the concert presented at Roseburg Senior High school by the school band and choruses. Leslie S. Irvin, conductor, reported to the audience that the concert was presented as a benefit, now amounts to more than \$1,000, or approximately one-half of the sum required to purchase the type of uniform which has been selected.

He also announced plans to bring the University of Oregon band to Roseburg for a benefit concert early in May. With one half of the proceeds to go to the uniform fund.

Last night's program included selections by the band, numbers by the girls' chorus and the boys' chorus, with a finale including both vocal groups and the band. Georgene Shanklin was accompanist for chorus numbers.

Shell Eggs May Not be Bought This Year by U. S.

With war requirements for top quality shell eggs in 1945 larger than in 1944 and civilian needs expected to be about the same, it appears likely that an adequate market may be available so that government buying of shell eggs for price support will not be necessary. Shortages of egg cases, labor and transportation might interfere, however, with normal distribution and make some purchases necessary although adequate markets actually exist.

WFA will stand ready to support the producer's market for shell egg purchases if necessary. Canned eggs will be purchased from authorized buying stations certifying that the producer received not less than 27 cents a dozen, cases not included. The eggs are to be nest run domestic hen eggs marketed without removal of top grade or large eggs and which are candied by the first buyers. Where candling facilities are not available, WFA will stand ready to support the producer price for current receipt eggs by purchase from county buying stations that certify the producer has received not less than 24 cents a dozen, cases not included. These must be domestic hen eggs, nest run, which have not been candied, graded or otherwise sorted.

MEAT, BUTTER, CHEESE:
Book 4—Red stamps Q5 through S5 valid through March 31. Red stamps T5 through X5 valid through April 24. Red stamps Y5 through D2 valid through June 2.
Red stamps E2, F2, G2, H2, J2 valid March 4 through June 30.
SUGAR:
Book 4—Sugar stamp 24 valid through February 28. Sugar stamp 25 valid through June 2.
SHOES: LOOSE STAMPS INVALID.

GASOLINE COUPONS NOT VALID UNLESS ENDORSED:

VICTORY GARDENS FOR TURKEYS.

It may sound a bit extreme to raise a victory garden for your turkey or chicken flock, but on the other hand, we might have something at that. One big reason for having a garden is to get your vegetables absolutely fresh. Instead of picking them off the shelves of your grocery many days or even weeks after they came out of the field. They taste so much sweeter and crispier and yum-yum.

We want you to plant some green feed for both turkeys and chickens. We have the seed for it. You may call that your victory garden.

But what we started out to say is that your birds like fresh feed the same as you like fresh vegetables. You know what makes a 30 pound tom quick, or an early developed pullet? It's eating LOTS of good feed every day. No matter how good the feed might have been when it was first mixed, it isn't very tasty to the birds after it has set around in some warehouse or feed room a few weeks. Neither does it have the vitamins it originally did.

To get the best feed consumption, and at the same time best use of the feed, give your turkeys and chickens Umpqua Feeds. It is so fresh that many times you may have to wait a few minutes for it to come off the sacker. It never stays in our warehouse more than a few days, and you shouldn't keep it in your feed room more than a couple weeks. That way, your birds always relish their meals.

Due to the feed scare last spring some of our friends bought feed (from other companies), and stored their season's supply in the spring. Some bought Umpqua Feeds and mixed in, to get the old feed used up; others lost growth on birds

due to stale feed, and some few just took pity on the birds and fed what was left to the hogs. All growers agreed on one thing: storing feed more than five or six weeks is NOT A PAYING PROPOSITION.

CARBOLINEUM.

Today is the first of March. That in itself doesn't mean much, except that it is a reminder that "Time marches on." And that it won't be long now until we get some warm weather. And that warm weather encourages egg production, especially of red mites in chicken houses.

It is well to remember that one application annually of carbolineum is guaranteed by the manufacturers to prevent mite infestation for a full year. You not only save a lot of time fighting mites, but your birds have more energy left to produce eggs. Now is a good time to use carbolineum, and the Douglas Flour Mill is a good place to buy it.

TEACH 'EM TO ROOST.

We have always nagged at you to get your chicks and poults up on the roosts by the time they are three weeks old. Yes, we know some full grown hens and turkeys still roost on the ground. But that doesn't prove it is the right thing to do.

Every expert states that sanitation is the keystone of success with poultry and turkeys. Every beginner agrees that such is logical. Sanitation is certainly better controlled after birds are on roosts.

Provided, of course that the roosts are so constructed that birds cannot get to their own droppings. This means there should be netting or slats under the roosts. There is probably NO BETTER WAY to get a disease outbreak started and NO HARDER WAY TO STOP

IT than to let the little rascals paddle around in their droppings day and night.

WHO IS BROODING WHO?

After many years of a battle which still continues, it is gratifying to note that some gains are being made, even though it is measured in feet and yards, as the war news states. We refer to the old idea that chicks and poults should be brooded at high temperatures.

We now find lots of brooder houses where the temperatures say old chicks are down to 90° and even less. Chicks like it too, they do well, have keen appetites, feather quick, stay healthy.

We have noticed for years that chicks do best in brooder houses that are barely comfortable to humans. But after all, it is the chicks which are being brooded, so their comfort is most important. More chicks and poults are harmed every year by too much heat than by chilling. Let's avoid both, by running our brooder stoves just as cool as possible without having the babies pile up against the stove.
