Open House to be Held March 9 by Teen Age Club

At a meeting of the combined committees at the High school Monday, plans were drawn up to hold open house at the Teen Age club at the armory Friday night, March 9, for parents and townpeople, who are interested in this youth project. A program is being planned and will be presented in the form of class competition as a talent show. However, the public is urged to drop in and view the activities any time during that evening.

Since considerable doubt has come up in the public's mind concerning eligibility for entrance into the club, the following regulations have been drawn up by the student committee members: (1) 9th grade to 19 years of age, (2) purchase of a membership ticket, (25c covering period from February 1, to June 1, 1945); (3) member of Senior or Junior High student body or enrolled in either school; if not apply for membership ticket from recreational director at the Chamber of Commerce office and have employer or some business man sign card and give letter of recommendation; (4) a member has the privilege of bringing in one out-of-town civilian guest on his or her membership card, providing the guest is of teen age, and (5) service men of teen age who were formerly enrolled in the Roseburg schools may be admitted if with a member of the club.

The student committee members are: Stanley Mitchell, chairman; Marilyn Preston, Tom Dillard, Yvonne Byrd, John Ulrich and Joyce Bartley. The supervisory committee consists of Miss Aileen Peterson, recreational director; Miss Grace Covert, dean of girls at the High school; Miss Dorothy Moore, physical education instructor; Mrs. Helen Saar, president of Junior Women's club; Mrs. J. A. Harris, treasurer of Junior Women's club, and Miss Vivian Kershner, supervisor of recreational program.

Supervisors for Friday night will be: Grace Covert, Dorothy Moore, Ruth Laughlin, Vivian Kershner, Aileen Peterson, Virginia Rorden, Athalia Taylor and Dorothy Larkin.

The Teen Age club is being assisted by the Junior Chamber of Commerce.

GIVE TO THE RED CROSS

The time has arrived for the annual appeal of the American Red Cross for funds with which to carry on its vital, humanitarian work. While we are spending billions of dollars monthly to meet the costs of global war, we are asked as a nation to give only a few million dollars for the purpose of saving lives and relieving suffering.

If we spent in peacetime as much money for humanitarian purposes as we spend to maintain huge armies and navies and to train men to spread death and destruction, we could, perhaps, eliminate the principal causes of war. Now, during the worst holocaust the world has ever known, the amount we are asked to raise to carry on the humane, utilitarian work of the Red Cross is infinitesimal in comparison with the sums being expended to spread death and destruction among our enemies.

It is impossible to appraise by monetary standards the work of the Red Cross. Who can measure, in dollars, the value of life snatched from the clutching fingers of death? Who can evaluate sanity? Who can place a dollar sign upon a Red Cross gift box arriving in a camp of starving prisoners of war? Who can specify the worth of a bottle of plasma trickling into the veins of a battle-shocked, wounded soldier? Who can give the monetary value of a clubmobile, meeting fliers returning from a dangerous mission, to give a cherry smile and a morale-lifting word along with a cup of coffee and a doughnut? Who can measure by any material standard the helping hand extended the wounded in our hospitals, the care given the convalescent, the entertainment provided lonely, homesick service men or the thousands of other services, at home and abroad, furnished by the American Red Cross?

Plans are being made for a whirlwind drive in Douglas county to enlist every home in aid to the American Red Cross. Here is a cause to which everyone should give, and give freely.

There has been suggested as an absolute minimum for working people the equivalent of one day's wages. This, we stress, is the suggested MINIMUM.

We doubt if there is a man, woman or child in Douglas county who would not be willing to give far more than one day's pay if he could directly save the life or ease the suffering of a man in our armed forces. It is not possible for us to be on every battle field, or even in one combat zone in person. But the American Red Cross is there as our proxy. Wherever our fighting men are congregated, the loving arm of the Red Cross—the arm of the folk back home—is extending care and comfort.

The American Red Cross is asking the people of this nation for \$200,000,000 in this annual war fund campaign. Of this sum, \$60,000,000 will remain in the 3,757 local chapters to be used exclusively for local relief purposes.

Among services for which our money will be used is the gathering of blood plasma, which cost more than \$6,000,000 last year; aid to war prisoners, which cost more than \$1,200,000; the nursing service, representing a cost of more than two and one-half million dollars.

The Red Cross is ready to meet every deserving appeal made upon it for help. Let us be as ready to meet the appeal of the Red Cross.

SALEM, Ore., March 1.—(AP)—Governor Snell today appointed Aubrey R. Watsek, Portland, to the state board of higher education, succeeding Robert W. Ruhl, Medford publisher, whom the governor said asked to be replaced.

Watsek is a graduate of Yale University and holds a law degree from Harvard. He has been in the lumber business in Oregon since 1913, is a director of the Portland Library association, and has served as regent and president of the board of trustees of Reed college.

VANCOUVER, Wash., March 1.—(AP)—Four Vancouver high school boys have confessed beating Gary Dingerson, 14, Kelso High school band member, after the Friday night Kelso-Vancouver basketball game, city police said today.

Police Sgt. Dewey Crowley said the boys, ages 16-17, cut and badly bruised Gary as he was walking on the highway near his home.

Dingerson's father is principal of the Kelso grade school.

Machine Works at Reedsport Sold

REEDSPORT — Cecil H. Bennett, owner of the Reedsport Machine and Boiler Works, today announced sale of his business, including his waterfront property in which his plant is located. The new owners are Lee Bernhardt and a Mr. Van Fleet, the latter a recent arrival from Portland. Mr. Bernhardt has been employed in the plant for the past 12 years and has been serving as master machinist.

The sale price was not announced, but is reported to be in the neighborhood of \$25,000.

Infant Death Rate in Oregon Shows Decrease

PORTLAND, March 1.—(AP)—Oregon set a new record in 1944 with 970 survivors out of every 1,000 live births, a state board of health report showed today.

A pronounced decline in the previous death rate was shown—30.1 to every thousand births. The board said the maternal death rate increased slightly.
