Court Forces Return of Land to Japanese Owner
OREGON CITY, Ore., March 6—(AP)—An order directing holders of a farm lease to yield the land to the Japanese-American owner who has returned to the Pacific coast, was on file in circuit court here today.

Judge Latourette yesterday instructed a jury to find Mr. and Mrs. Dale Bergh guilty of encroachment on land they leased through the War Relocation authority. The owner is Masayuchi Fujimoto. No penalty is involved.

Attorney Glen Jack, who argued that the lease was for the duration and not limited to the absence of the Nisei owner, said appeal will be taken. Bergh heads an organization opposing return of persons of Japanese ancestry.

40-Hr. Devotion Set At Catholic Church

Slayer of Estranged Wife Draws Life Term
CHEHALIS, Wash., March 6—(AP)—William King, 45-year-old Astoria, Ore., fisherman, who last week pleaded guilty in the Lewis county superior court to the fatal stabbing of his estranged wife, Rose, on July 20 of last year at Pe Ell, will serve a life term in the state penitentiary.

The penalty was determined Monday afternoon by a jury that deliberated only 30 minutes.

Rising Rivers, Sub-Zero Cold Face Midwest

(By Associated Press)

March showed its lionish side today as sub-zero weather overspread midland states and heavy rains sent the Ohio and Mississippi rivers rising threateningly. Scores of families fled to high ground.

The cold wave which began in the northwest yesterday pushed southward and eastward today. Sub-zero readings were recorded in Minnesota, the Dakotas, Wyoming, Montana, northwest Iowa and extreme northern Nebraska. Freezing temperatures reached from lower Michigan, northern Illinois, Missouri and Oklahoma into northern Texas.

Bemidji, Minn., had the nation's official low of 35 degrees below zero, in contrast to Jacksonville, Fla., which recorded 91 above yesterday.

Residents of the Ohio valley watched with trepidation as leaden skies poured rain into the swollen Ohio river. Rain also covered the entire Mississippi valley.

Incessant downpours fed swollen tributaries of the two great rivers from Pittsburgh to Memphis. At Cincinnati, where flood stage was 52 feet, the Ohio rose beyond 64 feet, and river men predicted a possible 70-foot crest, highest recent stage there for the Ohio was 79.99 feet in 1937, when floods caused approximately \$400,000,000 property loss.

Louisville residents were warned to prepare for a 44 to 45-foot stage on the Ohio. Flood stage is 28 feet. One sandbag levee, hastily thrown up in the last two days to protect low sections of Louisville, broke and all residents of the area were evacuated.

At Aurora, Ind., a call was issued for manpower and trucks to move residents to higher ground. Ohio river flood waters had reached about half of the business district and one-third of the residential district.

Rains made the big Mississippi, also too big for its ditches and scores of families fled to higher ground. In Lauderdale county, Tenn., The Red Cross rushed tents and cots to 75 farm families evacuated from lowlands. Approximately 300 more were expected to be moved today.

Churchill Views Ruins Of Siegfried Line City

JUELICH, Germany, March 3—(delayed by censor)—(AP)—Prime Minister Churchill paid a call to Germany today in a long-awaited personal triumph.

Adolf Hitler was not on hand to receive him.

The 70-year-old prime minister walked into Germany through the shattered Siegfried line, once the symbol of the might of Hitler who four years ago was promising to visit London.

Churchill looked around the ruins of this fortress city—the most destroyed city since St. Lo—without visible displeasure and said grimly: "There will not be any unemployment around here after the war."

Sinatra Plans Tour of Army, Navy Hospitals

NEW YORK, March 6—(AP)—Frank Sinatra, back in 4-F after being classified for two days as engaged in work "necessary to the national health, safety and interest," plans a nationwide tour of army navy hospitals beginning this month, his press agent, announced today.

A 2-A-F classification had been given Sinatra by his Jersey City draft board on Saturday, but yesterday the four-man board unanimously voted him back in 4-F.
