SWELL BABY CHIX.

We are finding a lot of baby chix over the county these days, and they are nearly all doing a fine job of growing. There is a little curly-toe paralysis, but none of it has developed in chix where the breeders were fed Umpqua Breeder's Mash.

As usual, we find them doing best where the temperatures are not overly high, ventilation good and plenty of feed hoppers. Some folks have timidly dispensed with fences around the brooder stoves and carpets over the litter for the first time this year. To their amazement, the chix did well without these commonly recommended nuisances. Also, a very few failed to dunk the chix, (commonly called dipping the beaks in water). And believe it or not, they learned to drink!!!

All of which proves there is no mystery connected with raising good chicks or poulters. It just takes common sense, good stock, good sanitation, plenty room, plenty feeders and waterers plenty of good feed, (AND WHEN WE SAY FEED, WE MEAN UMPQUA) and attention to a few thousand little details.

It is hard to say just how much feeding space should be allowed. It is a good plan to have at least one of those convenient pastboard feeders to each fifty chicks or poulters for the first few days. After that add feeders often enough that there is always plenty of room for timid birds. Lack of sufficient feeding space causes lots of runts and low vitality birds.

Come to think of it, we don't think we ever saw a brooder house that had too many feed hoppers in it.

PARALYSIS IN PULLETS.

The disease that probably causes more mortality in chickens than all others combined is the so-called paralysis or leukosis-complex. This disease takes several different forms, such as "gray-eye", "big-liver", "range paralysis", etc. There is no way to foretell when a bird is coming down with it, and by the time it shows up, there is no cure and no treatment that will help.

The government has a million dollar experiment station back in Michigan and many men spending their entire time studying this single disease. Out of all the information so far gathered, one thing has come out that YOU can do to help yourself.

It has been discovered that MOST of the birds that eventually show symptoms of leukosis pick up the germ or virus during the first TWO WEEKS of life. Therefore—if you can protect the babies from exposure completely during those first two critical weeks, your losses will be much smaller.

Why not divide the work during the first two weeks of brooding? Mom can brood the babies and stay away from the old hen's house while Pop does everything around the layers for two whole weeks. This might or might not be fun, but certainly it has possibilities.
