

Proposal for Hall Site Turned Down By Legion Post

Committee Resigns, Another is Appointed; Local Elimination in Oratorical Contest Stated

Umpqua post of the American Legion at its regular meeting Tuesday night rejected a proposal of its building committee that the post purchase the vacant lot at the corner of Washington and Kane streets as a site for a future veterans hall. This action was followed by the resignation of the committee and the appointment of a new planning group composed of V. J. Micelli, Bruce Melis and Percy Croft. The post has approximately \$15,000 available in its building fund.

Cooperation in the Red Cross War Fund campaign was voted and the post appropriated \$25 from its treasury as a contribution to the Red Cross drive.

Clothing Gather Reported
R. L. Preston submitted a report on the drive for clothing in the Russian relief campaign. This work was sponsored by the American Legion with cooperation from schools of the county, through the efforts of Mrs. Lula C. Gorrell, county school superintendent, and from various church groups. More than six tons of clothing were collected, Preston reported.

Plans were announced for a party to be held by the post and auxiliary at the Roseburg Country club March 20 in celebration of the American Legion's 27th anniversary. Earl Plummer is chairman of the committee on arrangements.

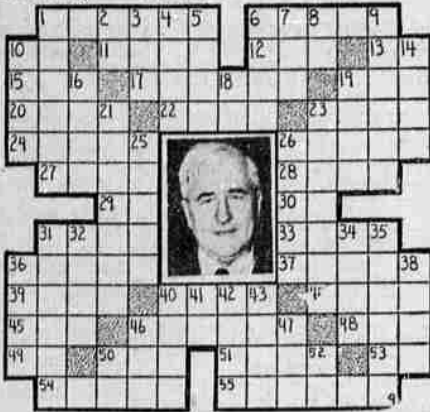
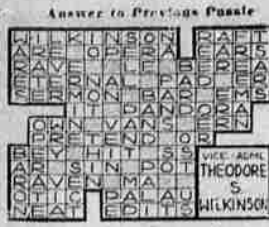

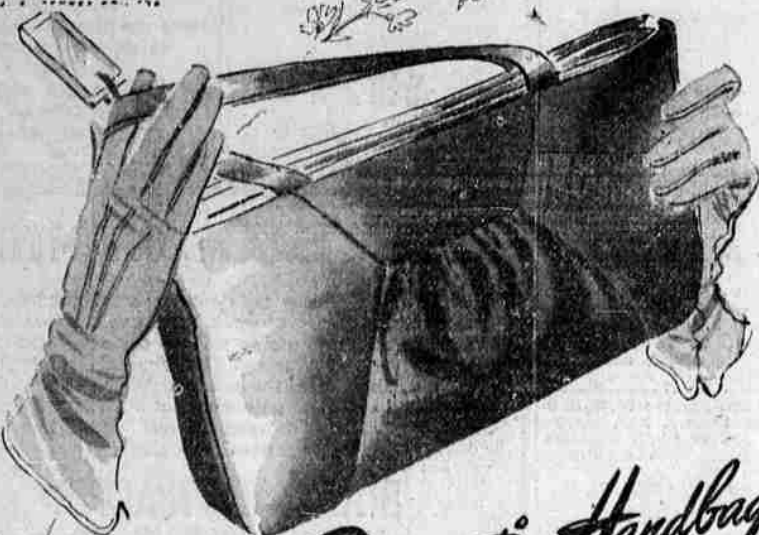
