Truck-Auto Collision Costs Three Lives

MODESTO, Calif., March 10—(AP)—A woman drowned in oil from a broken crankcase, and two men died of skull fractures in a truck-automobile collision today a mile north of Turlock, Stanislaus county coroner Jack K. Ransom reported.

The victims were Mrs. Emma Lucille Tweedy, her husband, Howard Tweedy, Marysville, Calif., and Dwight B. Ames, 23, Sanger, Calif., a navy cook. Tweedy was driving a Marysville Box and Lumber company truck loaded with box shooks. Ames was alone in a light car. Mrs. Tweedy, riding with her husband, was pinned under the wreckage.

Escaped Convict Sought In Murder of 3 Women

WASHINGTON, March 10—(AP)—Police are hunting an escaped convict, with a handsome face and winning ways, to ask what he knows about the deaths of three women in three widely scattered cities.

The fugitive, Joseph Medley, 43, was charged with first degree murder in the death of Mrs. Nancy Boyer, 45, in a warrant issued today on the motion of detective chief Robert J. Barrett. Mrs. Boyer was shot three times early Tuesday morning.

Barrett added that Medley also is wanted for questioning concerning the identical deaths of two women whose nude bodies were found in hotel room bathtubs in Chicago and New Orleans.

Alaska Votes Vets Bonus, Cracks Down on Drunks

JUNEAU, Alaska, March 10—(AP)—The house passed the \$1,500,000 soldiers' bonus bill, providing \$100 plus \$20 for each month in service for all servicemen who were Alaska residents prior to Sept. 16, 1940.

The house also passed the bill making it unlawful to sell or give intoxicants to an habitual drunkard, defined as one who has been convicted three times of drunkenness.

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Two Roseburg Men Win Combat Badge For War Service

Two Roseburg men, veterans of overseas fighting in the Pacific theater, have been awarded the Combat Infantryman badge at Camp Roberts, Calif. They are T/5 William B. Patterson, son of Mr. and Mrs. B. F. Patterson, 747 S. Pine St., Roseburg, and Sergeant Robert L. Teater, son of Mr. and Mrs. E. L. Teater, 638 E. 1st Ave. N., Roseburg.

Cpl. Patterson went overseas in March, 1942, and served in Australia and New Guinea before returning to this country for hospitalization in April, 1944. Now stationed at Camp Roberts, he is serving as armor-artificer in Company D, 86th battalion. His award was in recognition of exemplary conduct in action against the Japs in New Guinea.

Sergeant Teater, who was awarded his badge for exemplary conduct against the enemy in the south Pacific, went overseas in December, 1941, and served in Hawaii, Guadalcanal, New Georgia, New Zealand and New Caledonia before returning to this country under the rotation plan in May, 1944. Now stationed at Camp Roberts, he is assigned to Company B, 90th battalion, where he is serving as a platoon sergeant.

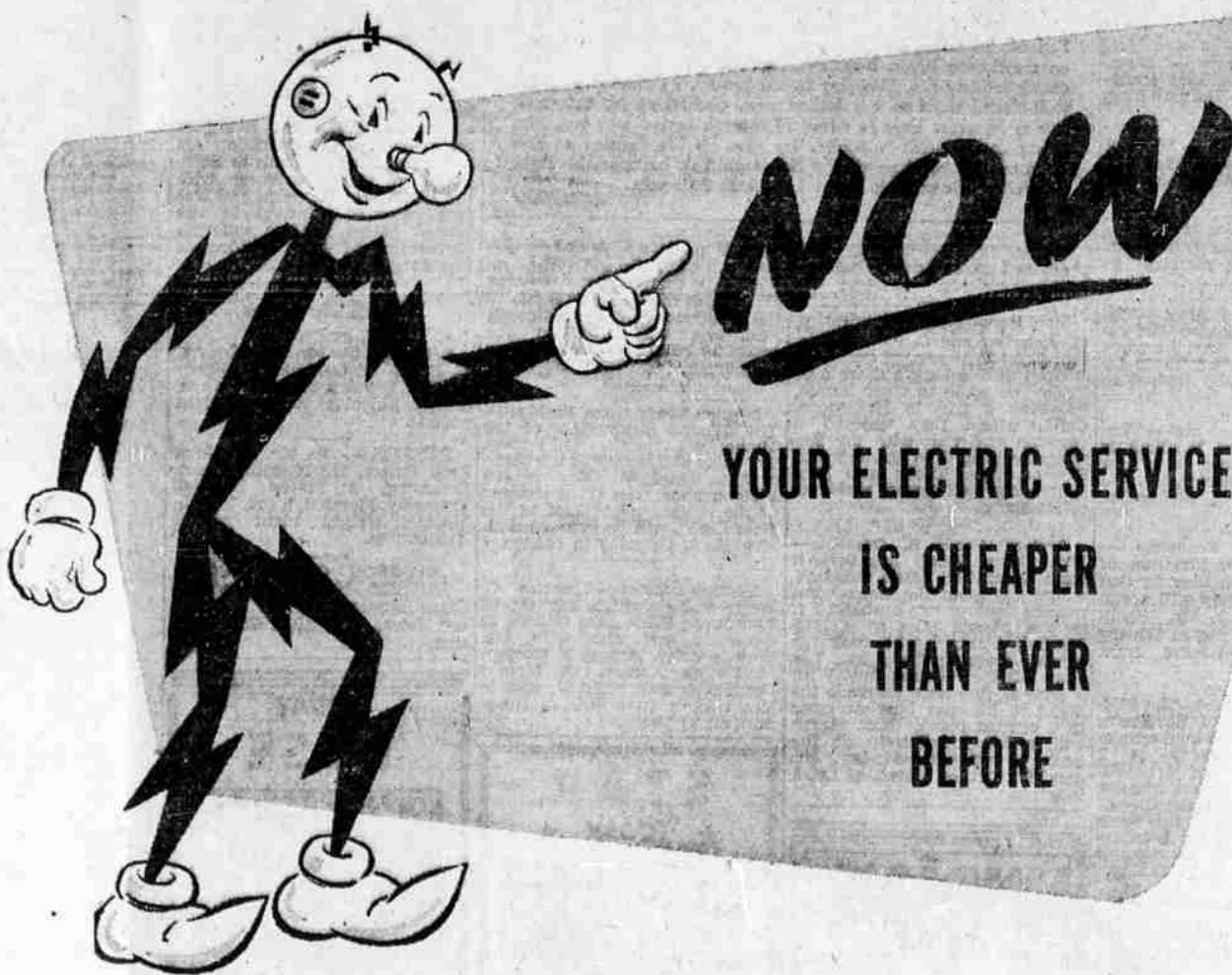
