The senate roads and highways committee disposed of a piece of controversial legislation when it decided to bury the house-approved bill establishing a new system of taxing trucks. The bill would have taxed them on a ton-mile basis.

Jap Issue Sidetracked — A bitter fight on the house floor over memorials asking congress to deport disloyal and alien Japanese and to prevent return of Japanese to the west coast was averted when the house resolutions committee decided not to send them to the floor.

Resourceful Landlord Finally Clashes With Law

PHOENIX, Ariz., March 14 — (AP) — A landlord, unable to move tenants from a home they had occupied 13 years, brought suit for possession for remodeling purposes.

Defeated in court, the landlord began dismantling the house. He removed plumbing, boarded up windows after removing the glass, and even took out a section of the roof, replacing it with canvas through which rain dripped. The tenants stayed on. He sued for possession for "demolition" purposes, won the case, and the tenants moved.

Now he's on trial on a charge of unlawfully evicting the occupants because, the prosecution asserts, he repaired and rented the dwelling to another tenant.

Honnef Captured by American First Army

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of Remagen.

Allied military men look for the formal end of the European war some time this summer, a field dispatch from the U. S. Ninth army front said, but they believe the Germans must be pursued all across Germany and that actual destruction of German arms may take longer. Optimism in Britain, however, was tempered by a warning of War Secretary Grigg that "we have had one false dawn."

Luftwaffe Raid Broken — At least 60 German planes attacked the bridgehead yesterday, of which ten were destroyed, five probably destroyed and six damaged in fighting which cost four American planes. Auto-aircraft, heavily concentrated in the bridgehead area, brought down an estimated number of other enemy planes.

In eight days the Third and First armies took about 40,000 prisoners.

In the north front reports said the Germans nervously expected a Rhine crossing. Marshal Montgomery's headquarters reported that with U. S. Ninth and Canadian First armies took 50,477 prisoners in their Rhine operations.

Allied bombers smashed at Germany from the west and south, following last night's five-pronged RAF assault at targets all the way from the western front to Berlin. The capital was hit for the 22nd straight night.

U. S. Fifth army troops in Italy intensified the threat to German positions in Vergato, road stronghold 14 miles southwest of Bologna, as strong patrols edged ahead north of the city. Other troops are menacing the stronghold from the south, east and west.

Denny, Counsel for FCC, Named to Seat on Board

WASHINGTON, March 14 — (AP) — Charles R. Denny, Jr., was nominated by President Roosevelt today to membership on the Federal Communication commission.

Denny, now FCC general counsel, will succeed T. A. M. Craven, who resigned.
