Citizenship Given To 7 Persons Here

Seven Douglas county residents became American citizens at naturalization proceedings conducted today before Circuit Judge Carl E. Wimberly.

Included among the new citizens were Richard Hans Pund, Reedsport, a native of Germany; Andy Hempenius and his wife, Mina, both residents of Sutherlin and natives of Holland; Nelson Andrus, a native of the United States, re-naturalized from Canadian citizenship, and his daughter, Violet Elsie Burgess, native of Canada, both residents of Roseburg; Virginia Estelle Roberts, Roseburg, native of Canada; Rhoda Jane Lamoreaux, Sutherlin, re-naturalized from Canadian citizenship.

Examinations were conducted by Victor Hemmen, naturalization examiner who reports participating in 85 successful hearings for final papers in various Oregon cities within the past 13 days.

Two applications were continued, one because of failure of decisions of witnesses to arrive in time for proceedings today and the other to permit the applicant time for further study of the U. S. form of government.

Coast Fishing Bill Likely to Become Law (Continued from Page 1)

ceiling on old age pensions. The house passed a senate measure exempting life insurance annuities from taxation until the principal has been repaid.

The senate sent to the house by a 27-3 margin a bill creating

a state department of public health, with authority over hospitals, asylums and jails; industrial hygiene, and eating places. The senate approved a house measure to create an interim committee to study motor vehicle taxes. Similar committees have been created by the past three legislatures.

In a test vote, the senate refused 15-15 to recall from its ways and means committee the house-approved bill to provide retirement and disability benefits for paid and volunteer firemen.

To Tighten Disease Control The senate passed unanimously the house bill to provide for more rigid control of Bang's disease, and also approved house measures establishing a committee to select two Oregon citizens whose statues will be placed in statutory hall in the national capital, and short forms for income tax payments.

Governor Snell signed into law increasing from \$1,000,000 to \$1,500,000 the amount that may be borrowed from the common school fund for construction of a new state office building.

The house refused 34 to 24 to force its resolutions committee to send to the floor a memorial asking congress to deport alien and disloyal Japanese, and the house defeated 42 to 16 a senate bill to refer to the people a plan to build a \$500,000 psychiatric hospital in Portland. Hospitals now are located in Salem and Pendleton.

The senate sent to the governor bills to let the state foster care districts for control of insect pests, and to appropriate \$26,000 for health and physical

education programs in public schools.

Grange Threatens Bill The state grange threatened today to file suit challenging the constitutionality of the bill by Sen. Chessman, Astoria, to prevent people utility districts from serving outside their boundaries without the consent of the new customers.

The bill already has become law, since it carried an emergency clause and was signed by the governor two days ago.

Morton Tompkins, state grange master who led an unsuccessful battle against the bill, said it would retard creation of new PUD's and hamper the operations of those already in existence.

Tompkins criticized Governor Snell for signing it after Attorney General Neuner said it is unconstitutional.

Coast Guardsman Claims He Enlisted Under Threat

PORTLAND, Ore., March 15—(AP)—Edward G. Conway is asking discharge from the U. S. coast guard, claiming he was forced to enlist three years ago under threat that his mother would lose her home.

In a federal court suit, Conway charged that when he went to the Seattle coast guard office for a passport to serve in the merchant marine he was told to enlist or lose a \$1000 bond posted by his mother with her home as security.

Stimson Knows no Plan To Junk Alaskan Highway

WASHINGTON, March 15—(AP)—Secretary of War Stimson said today he knew of no plans to abandon the Alaskan highway in Canada.

He was asked about the statement of Senator Magnuson (D-Wash.) in the senate yesterday that he understood the highway, built to form a military link between the United States and Alaska, would be abandoned.

"I know of no such plan," Stimson replied.

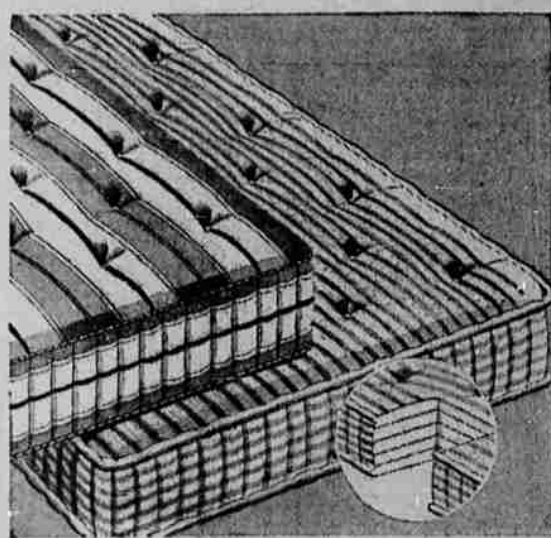
