SALEM, Ore., March 17.—(AP)—The Oregon City Pioneers, who squeezed past Medford 41-40 last night for the upset of the year, will battle it out with Washington High of Portland tonight for Oregon's 1945 basketball crown. Washington trounced Baker 51-41 in the first semi-final contest last night.

Reedsport and Clatskanie will clash for the state "B" championship. Reedsport swamped Arlington 55-53, while Clatskanie won Grant Union of John Day, 44-27. The B game will start at 7:30 p. m. and the "A" finals at 8:45.

Oregon City turned the tables on the husky Medford Tigers, unbeaten all season, after trailing through the entire first half. With only 45 seconds left to play, a roaring crowd saw Medford's Bob Watson miss a free throw that would have tied the game.

Reedsport, pride of the B leagues, rolled over Arlington in a game which set a new individual high scoring record. Reedsport's 6-foot-3 center, Clyde De Witt, potted 24 points, topping the 1944 record of 33 points made by Curt Luckey, Springfield.

Reedsport Lions Aid Cagers, Hear Crippled Veteran

REEDSPORT—At the last weekly meeting, Gardner-Reedsport Lions club presented Jack Flug, principal of the Reedsport schools and also athletic coach, with a check for \$50 to assist in defraying the expense of the district champion basketball team on its trip to Salem this week to participate in the B class championship contests. In thanking the club, Mr. Flug announced that he had been informed by the state officials of the meet that the Reedsport team would have to be quartered at Independence, 19 miles distant from Salem. Immediately following the club meeting, President Durbin called the secretary of the Lions club at Salem and told him of this arrangement and within two hours Durbin received a phone call from Salem stating that quarters had been arranged for the Reedsport team at the State School for the Blind, in Salem, and that the team would have the use of the school gym for morning practice during its stay in the capital.

Returned Flier Talks
Lieut. "Bud" Gibbons, son of Lyon J. L. Gibbons, was an honored guest at this meeting and spoke of the war in Europe where, as a bomber pilot in the U. S. air force, he was shot down in his plane over Berlin last July and was for a number of months in a German hospital in that city, as a prisoner of war.

Lieut. Gibbons was released and returned to this country on the Gripsholm. Lieut. Gibbons lost a leg in his last mission, but is bright and cheerful and tells the story of his adventure in a plain manner and apparently without malice or anger. It is apparent that he believes a soldier's mission is war and that under such conditions one man has as much right as another to fight for his country. It is also apparent that he believes the Germans are much more humane in warfare than the Japs, or at least gives them that credit, as he was fairly well treated after capture. He gives great credit to the American and International Red Cross for furnishing the prisoners with food and other necessities, stating that the Germans are short of food and that black bread and soup are about all that they have to feed their own wounded as well as the prisoners of war.

Wm. Esterberg, Vet of Spanish War, Passes

William Esterberg, 77, resident of Portland and veteran of the Spanish-American war, died at the Veterans hospital here last Wednesday night. He was born in Finland in 1867 and came to the United States about 50 years ago.

No close relatives survive. Military services will be held at the Veterans cemetery Saturday afternoon at 1:30 o'clock. Arrangements are in charge of the Douglas Funeral home.
