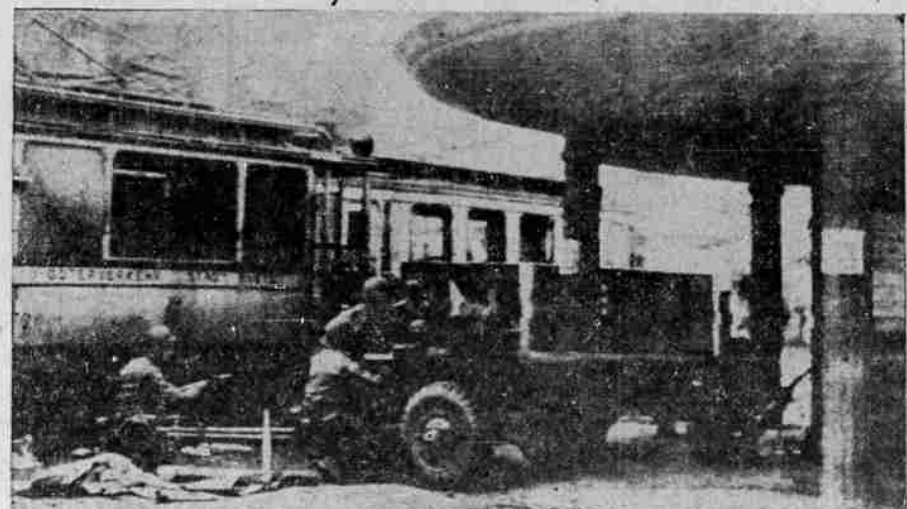

TO THE PEOPLE OF DOUGLAS COUNTY

Umpqua Angling Areas are Listed

Taking note of some misunderstanding with regard to what sections of the Umpqua river are now open to angling, Frank B. Wire, state game supervisor, reports there has been little change from regulations which prevailed last year.

The law, he reports, imposes the following regulations: The main Umpqua river below the forks and those of its tributaries west of highway 99 are now open to fishing for trout, steelhead and salmon ten inches or over in length.

"The South Umpqua river from its mouth to Jackson creek and the North Umpqua river from its mouth to the narrows are now open also to fishing for trout, steelhead and salmon ten inches or over in length. The tributaries, however, are closed to fishing until April 14.

"Above the narrows, the North Umpqua and its tributaries are open now to angling only for salmon and steelhead over 20 inches in length, except those tributaries that are closed to angling entirely.

"Above the mouth of Jackson creek, the South Umpqua and its tributaries are closed to angling for all species until April 14."

Nurse Enlistments Sag After January Spurt

WASHINGTON, March 19.—(AP)—Volunteer applications for the army nursing service have dropped down to previous "lower levels" after an upward spurt in January.

War Secretary Stimson advised the senate military committee the increase in the number of volunteers lasted for about three weeks after President Roosevelt asked in his annual message for drafting of nurses for the armed services.

"It is the judgment of the surgeon general that in the absence of legislation the requirements for army nurses will not be filled," Stimson added in a letter to the committee.

Undersecretary Robert Patterson read Stimson's letter at the outset of senate hearings on house legislation which would make unmarried nurses 20 to 44 liable for induction into the army and navy nursing corps.

War Requests Cut Asked To Guard Home Economy

WASHINGTON, March 19.—(AP)—Chairman J. A. Krug of the War Production board said today he was asking the military to scale down its demands sufficiently to protect a "bed-rock" war-supporting economy at home. "For the first time, increases in the army and navy production programs are coming right out of the civilian hide," Krug said. "The army and navy have agreed to hold their demands within such bounds," Krug said, and with their "very cooperative attitude" there is no danger of a breakdown of the domestic economy.

The body has been removed to the Douglas Funeral home and funeral arrangements will be announced later.
