Red Cross Fund So Far Indicates Quota is Assured

Incomplete returns in the Red Cross Fund drive indicate that Douglas county will make its quota of \$30,000, Lewis "Tommy" Atkins, county chairman, announced today. Roseburg has turned in approximately 33 1/3 per cent of its quota. Oakland reports having passed the 50 per cent mark. Brockway doubled last year's gift of \$35.75 by turn-

ing in \$71. Camas Valley turned in \$73 as against \$66 in 1944, Atkins said.

A little old lady came timidly into the Red Cross office Friday and after searching through her purse gave \$2, the chairman reported. She confided that all the money she received was from relief and "if I had more I'd gladly give more," he reported her as saying. "This truly is the widow's mite and it should give inspiration to those of us who are more able to give," Atkins said.

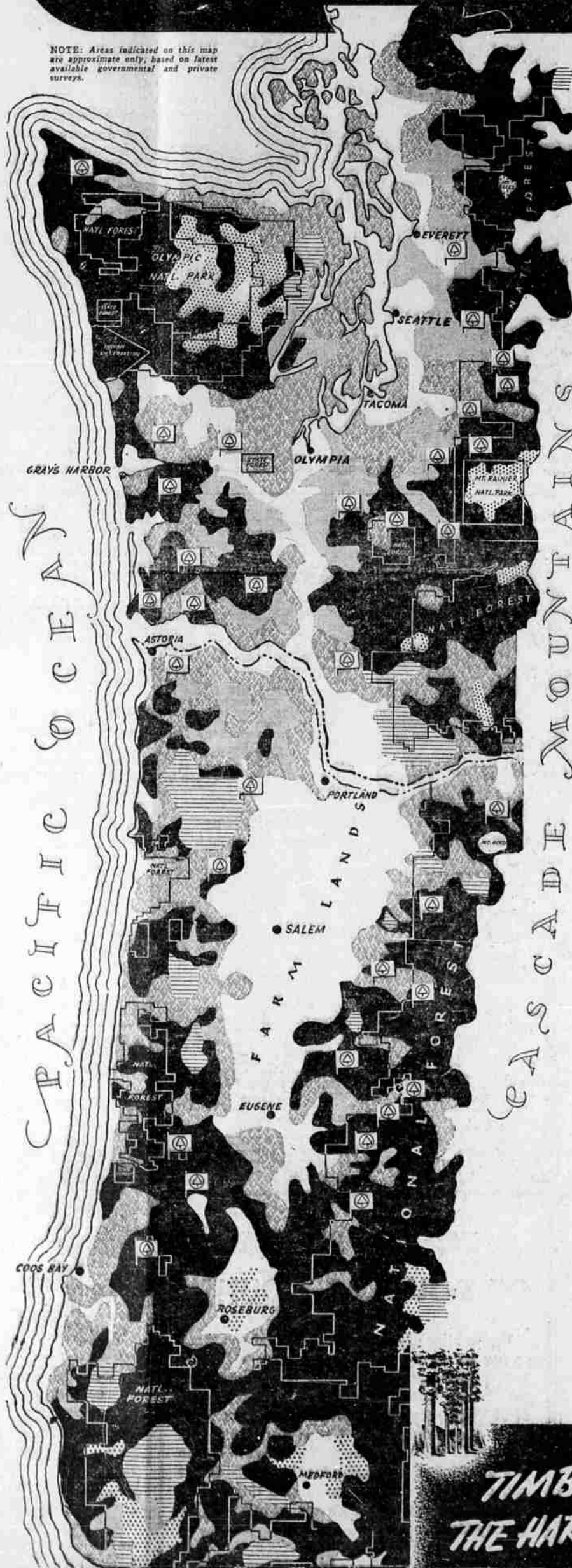

THE PACIFIC NORTHWEST IS GROWING TREES!



LEGEND



THIS MAP shows that over 73 per cent of the land in the Douglas fir region is growing trees. The timber crop will follow the virgin forest as a source of industry and pay-rolls.

The map shows we have:

- 1 25,800,000 acres of forested and forest-growing land, out of a total of 35,100,000 acres.
- 2 14,500,000 acres of saw timber, with an overall stand of 490 billion feet. Two-thirds of this acreage is natural old-growth; the other third is second-growth now over 16 inches in diameter.
- 3 7,800,000 acres of growing forest. Two-thirds of this area has trees from 6 to 16 inches in diameter; the other third has smaller saplings and seedlings.
- 4 1,500,000 acres recently cut-over. 150,000 to 200,000 acres are logged every year and three-fourths of these harvested areas reseeded naturally and promptly.
- 5 2,200,000 acres of Burns and Other lands not yet restocked. Beside the State and Federal Nurseries, an industry nursery is producing five or six million seedlings every year for replanting this land.
- 6 Over 2,000,000 acres of Tree Farms. Fifty-one owners, farmers and timber companies, are set up in the permanent business of growing trees.

47 per cent of this great forest resource, in acres, is owned by the county, State and Federal governments; 53 per cent by farmers and industrialists.

The cooperation of these public and private owners in forest management and protection is one of our real assets as a timber growing region. So is the support of its people in controlling forest fires—through such activities as *Keep Oregon Green* and *Keep Washington Green*. As more forest growth is assured, new forest industries come in for further processing or use of waste; and bring new pay-rolls with them.
