Roseburg Paratrooper Makes First Battle Leap On "Impossible" Island



PFC Ray Scofield, above, son of Dr. and Mrs. H. B. Scofield, Roseburg, made his first combat jump as an army paratrooper on Corregidor, according to a letter received by his parents. He went overseas last October, as a replacement with the 503rd parachute infantry, following training at Fort Benning, Ga.

Japanese, he reports, had made no defense against a landing by air, believing it impossible for paratroopers to land on the rocky island. "After I was on the ground and got a look around I, too, thought it impossible," Pvt. Scofield writes.

A graduate of Roseburg High school with the class of 1943, Scofield entered military service immediately after graduation and was assigned to the paratroopers. He had made six practice jumps prior to hitting Corregidor.

"We hear that the Japs are glad to die for their emperor," he writes. "We sure made a lot of them happy."

Coal Operators, Miners Deadlocked On Contract Issue

WASHINGTON, March 20.—(AP)—Bituminous coal operators reported today that their negotiations for a new contract with the United Mine Workers have "made no progress."

Ten days hence the old contract is due to expire and a strike vote has been ordered.

The operators announced the deadlock in the presence of John L. Lewis, UMW president, who commented only that "we still hope to reach an agreement."

Charles O'Neill, speaking for the coal producers, said the miners' flat rejection of the operators' counter proposals left the negotiations in a stalemate.

Neither O'Neill nor Lewis has asked government intervention and both declared they would appear for resumption of the conference tomorrow morning as usual.

When O'Neill had completed a lengthy statement outlining the situation as the operators saw it, Lewis challenged his figures as to the cost of the miners' 18 original demands. These included one for a union royalty of 10 cents a ton on coal mined.

The miners' president called the operators' figures "inflated, distorted and false."

"However," Lewis asserted, "we're not discouraged. We recognize the operators are staggering under their war loot and are naturally supremely arrogant in this conference."

"Their position on some matters is possibly brutal. Some items they reject with obvious contempt and others they are refusing to give any consideration to, while on some they claim to be without authority to consider."

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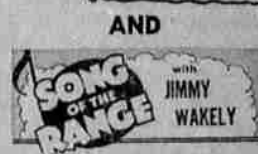
