THE 41ST GOES IN AGAIN

While scanning Oregon newspapers, included in our exchange list, we frequently find communications written to editors by parents of men of the 41st division, composed principally of Oregon national guardsmen, complaining because the troops are being kept too long away from home.

For more than three years the men of the 41st division have been overseas. They have been in active service at home and abroad for more than four years.

Had the 41st been assigned to the European theater, with its army of correspondents to chronicle all its heroic deeds, it would doubtless be one of the most famous of all armies of history.

Buna, Sanananda, Salamaua, Aitape, Hollandia, Wadke, Biak are victories to which the name of the 41st's "Jungleers" is ascribed.

Correspondents have not had the opportunity to give to the 41st its full share of publicity, such as has attended some of the armies fighting in places more exposed to public view.

But military authorities know the value of the 41st. No division in the United States army wears as many individual and collective decorations and citations.

When MacArthur invaded Luzon, the 41st was left behind on Biak island, scene of their latest victory, to serve as a reserve force if the divisions which accompanied the general could not swing the battle without assistance.

Now the 41st, which opened the way to the Philippines, is in the process of cleaning up Mindanao, second largest island of the Philippine group.

It is to be hoped that their present campaign, the ninth major offensive in which they have engaged, will be the last for the 41st and that they will be sent home for the rest they so richly deserve.

So, though we may yearn for the homecoming of the men of the 41st, our hearts can be filled with intense pride because of their accomplishments.

14 R. H. S. Boxers Slated for Clash With Springfield

Fourteen boxers, representing Roseburg Senior High school, will travel to Springfield to meet Springfield's Millers on March 28.

"The emphasis in training this week," Roy Sunderland, trainer, says, "is getting in condition and if a boy is in the best condition he should be able to go three 2-minute rounds with the punching bag."

A few other measures of exercise are shadow boxing, rounds with the bag and workouts with other fellows. Jumping rope is reported to strengthen back leg muscles and body exercises build up back, neck and leg muscles.

The weights of the Roseburg boys run from 114 to 180 pounds. Little information has been received on the Springfield boxers, so the RHS squad will weigh in with Springfield and will then be matched as evenly as possible.

A small boxing ring, bought by the Senior High school, arrived this week and will be set up in the Junior High school, where all future boxing meets will be held.
