Samuel E. Polovina tell the following story one night in the Roseburg Methodist Church. Some 40 years ago he came to America with six companions. They were all of the same age and nationality. They all began work in the coal mines. A few months after landing the young man Polovina was wonderfully converted. He visited all six of the young men but they refused to have anything to do with Christianity. One night three of them were killed in a drunken brawl. Later the other three killed two men and are now serving life sentences in the penitentiary. Three in their graves, three in the penitentiary, while Polovina has been preaching the unsearchable riches of the kingdom of Christ. What better proof do we need that the Christian life is the only kind of life worth living.—Amen.

War Public Services Functions Explained

Activities of the War Public Services agency were reviewed before the Roseburg Kiwanis club at its regular Tuesday luncheon program by Miss Gladys I. Everett, district field representative. The agency, which is participating in the recreational program at Roseburg, does not sponsor projects, Miss Everett related, but gives financial assistance to communities where there is a

special need owing to increased population resulting from war industry. Assistance is designed particularly for congested areas, where rapid influx of war workers imposes extra burdens upon communities in handling sanitation, housing, school facilities and recreation, she stated. In all cases, the community must provide local cooperation.

How to Make Hot Cross Buns

HOT CROSS BUNS

6 to 8 1/2 cups all-purpose flour 1 tsp. salt
1 egg 1/4 cup softened butter or margarine
1 tsp. cinnamon 1 cup seedless raisins
1/2 tsp. nutmeg 1/2 cup currants
1 cup milk 1 cup water
1 cake fresh yeast 1/4 cup sugar

Sift and measure flour and sift again with spices. Heat milk until bubbles form around edge; add water and cool to lukewarm. Add crumbled yeast, sugar and salt, stirring until yeast is dissolved; add beaten egg, then flour mixture all at once. Add butter or margarine, raisins and currants and work until dough leaves side of bowl. Turn out on lightly floured board, knead gently until smooth, about 3 minutes. Place dough in greased bowl, cover with damp cloth. Let rise in warm place until double in bulk, about 2 hours. Remove from bowl onto lightly floured board. Shape into ball; place on floured board; divide into four portions; shape each into ball; cover with damp cloth; and let stand 15 minutes. Divide each ball into 8 small ones; place on greased baking sheet 2 inches apart; cover; and let rise until almost double in bulk. Brush with egg wash (1 egg yolk beaten with 3 tablespoons water); cut shallow crosses with scissors on top of each roll. Bake 5 minutes in moderately hot oven (425° F.); reduce to moderate oven (350° F.); and bake 15 to 20 minutes longer, or until done. When almost cold, mark crosses with thin icing made of powdered sugar and just enough cream to spread easily. Makes 32 buns.

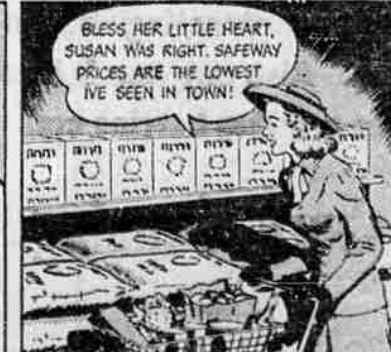
