SILVERTON, March 24—(AP)—Fifty hens and 2400 six week-old chicks were lost in a blaze that destroyed a brooder house early today on the Hubert Esser poultry and turkey farm. Esser estimated the loss at over \$2000. The fire was apparently spread from an oil burner.

Ferry Goes Aground SEATTLE, March 24—(AP)—The well-known streamlined ferry Kalakala went aground at Pleasant beach, on the south end of Bainbridge Island this morning, in 10 feet of water at slack tide. She was en route here from Bremerton.

Coal Operators, Lewis' Union Still Deadlocked

WASHINGTON, March 24—(AP)—Only a week remained today for John L. Lewis' United Mine Workers to agree on new wage contract terms with the nation's soft coal operators. Negotiations resumed with little evidence of any progress toward reaching a compromise on Lewis' demands which include a 10-cent-per-ton royalty payment to the union for a worker security fund.

So far Lewis had declined to discuss possibility of extending the existing contract beyond its March 31 expiration. He has kept mum, too, on whether he will call the miners out on strike. They will be polled next Wednesday on whether they wish to strike.

Harrison Named to Head Inter-American Affairs

WASHINGTON, March 24—(AP)—Wallace K. Harrison of Huntington, N. Y., was named by President Roosevelt today as director of inter-American affairs. Harrison has been acting executive officer of the agency since Nelson A. Rockefeller was named assistant secretary of state. His new post pays \$10,000 a year.

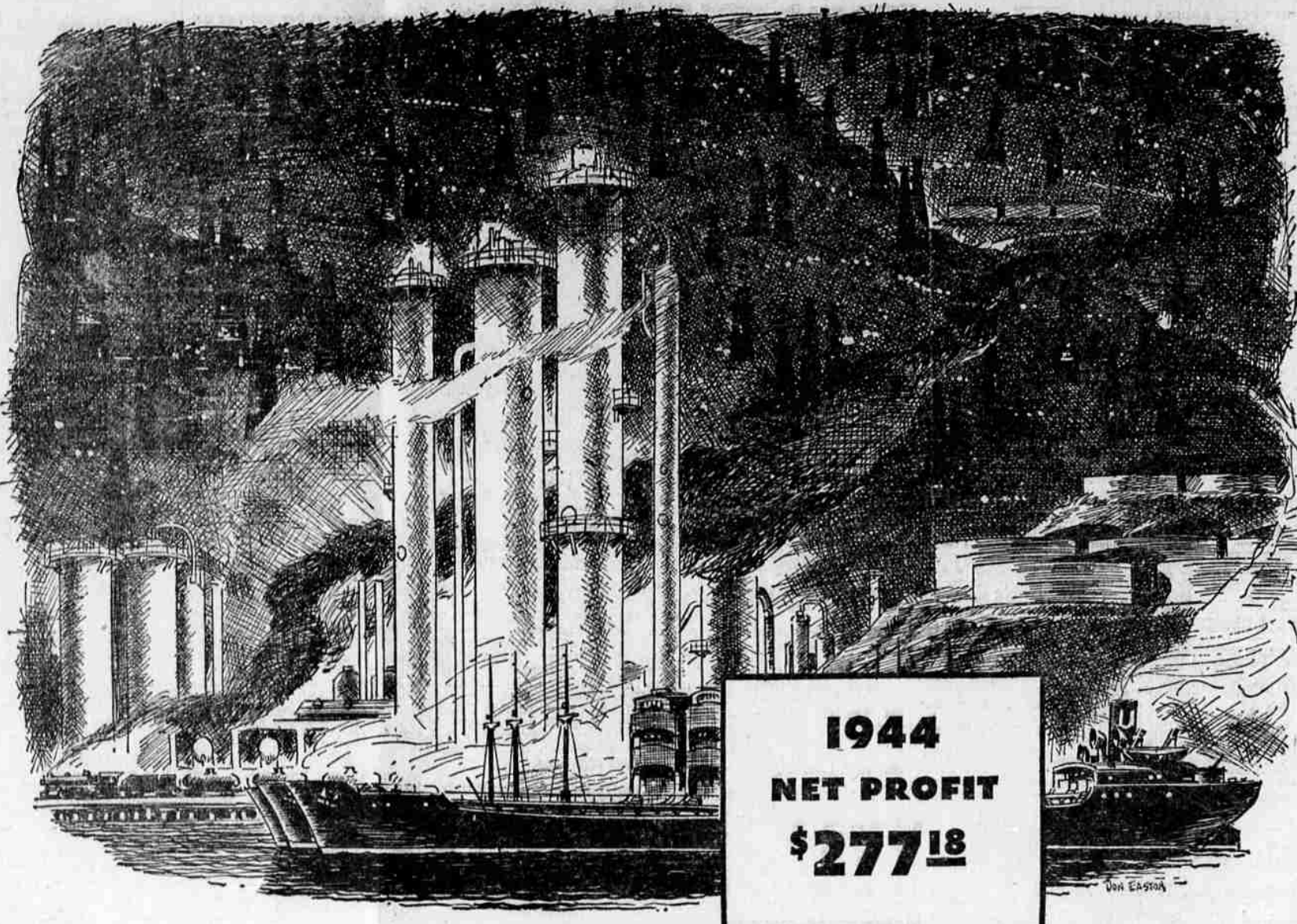
