Mill Operator Holds
Up Recreation Plan

WASHINGTON, March 26.
(AP)—Establishment of a new
recreational area near Portland,
Ore., may be delayed indefinitely
unless a sawmill owner with-
draws his objection, reported
Senator Guy Cordon.
Walter E. Koch, who operates
a mill near Brightwood, has pro-
tested the exchange of timber
rights between the forest service
and the Crown-Zellerbach cor-
poration on the ground that,
when he finishes with his own
tract, he wants to move into the
government timber which Zeller-
bach would get in the trade.
Regional Forester Lyle E.
Watts had written Cordon that
there are other large bodies of
timber available to Koch, ample
for his needs.

R. H. S. TO HAVE TURF FIELD

Roseburg High school expects to have a turf field upon
which to play football during the coming season. Through
efforts of the student body, funds have been raised for the
improvement, grass seed has been purchased, the field is
being graded and harrowed, and planting is anticipated
before the end of the week. Installation of water mains
also has been finished to provide ample moisture for the
field during the hot season. It is anticipated a substantial
sod surface will be established by the time the first home
game rolls around in late September.

A great deal of credit, we believe, is due the boys and
girls of Roseburg High school for their efforts in securing
a modern athletic field. For nearly three years they have
been saving money toward this improvement. A fund was
started two years ago and had just about reached the re-
quired amount, when some unknown person stole the
money which had been carelessly left in the school build-
ing. Very angry, but undismayed, the students started
again from scratch and now have produced for the second
time a sum sufficient to seed the field.

Roseburg has long had one of the best high school athletic
fields, aside from sod surface, in the state of Oregon. The
Roseburg field was one of the first high school arenas in
the state to be lighted. The student body issued bonds,
which were sold to sports enthusiasts to raise the fund for
the purchase of lighting equipment, and only recently suc-
ceeded in paying off the debt. Through cooperative action
of the student body, the school board and the WPA a fine
grandstand was erected.

The Roseburg field is composed of sandy loam which
provides a fast playing surface even when wet. It is well
drained and packed. It is believed the soil is of the right
character to promote a very healthy sod. The grass to be
used was selected with extreme care and after consultation
with some of the best authorities. There is every reason
to expect that the surface, after becoming well established,
which probably will require at least two years, will be
one of the best in the state.

The decision to proceed with the improvement was nearly
upset last week, when a very tempting offer was made to
the student body by the Douglas County Mounted Police.

The sheriff's posse is planning to sponsor a rodeo at Ro-
seburg in the late spring or early summer, and use of the
athletic field was suggested for a night performance. A
proposal, which might have netted around \$2,000 for the
school's athletic fund, was made by the mounted police,
but was finally rejected because of the intense desire of
students, particularly some of the members of the graduat-
ing class, to see the project on which they have worked
so diligently brought to successful conclusion. It obviously
was not possible to seed the field now and have it used for
a horse show within 90 days, and postponement of turfing
for one year would have been necessary if the offer had
been accepted.

The mounted police have decided, and wisely in our
opinion, to hold their rodeo in Umpqua park where the
county court has purchased land to be used as a fair grounds.
Work is to be started soon in preparing rodeo facilities,
and it is very probable that lights will be installed to make
a night show possible.

While the initial cost to the posse may be more than had
the athletic field been utilized, we believe the decision to
use the future fair grounds property will prove more sat-
isfactory over a period of years, as a start will have been
made toward a permanent recreational development.
And while preparations go forward for an improved
athletic field and for rodeo facilities, the residents of Ro-
seburg and vicinity should be proud and grateful that we
have two such enterprising groups as the high school
student body and the Douglas County Mounted Police.
