one of his typical rampages. So much for the western front. In the east, the Russians seem to be concentrating on Vienna, which they are approaching from three sides.

There is heavy fighting in Hungary, where the reds are about 75 miles from Vienna. They report that in the "past few days" they have taken 83,000 German prisoners and destroyed more than 1,000 German tanks.

PATTON is operating under a tight security blackout, with little information as to his movements. The map suggests that he too may be headed for Vienna and a possible junction with the Russians.

Don't discount this fighting for Vienna, which is as important to the ending of the war as Berlin. Vienna is the eastern gateway to the mountain region where the nazis are reported to be planning to take to the hills for a guerrilla last stand.

There is still little or no news from the Russians on the Oder east and northeast of Berlin. This suggests that the Germans may be holding HARDEST there.

EISENHOWER is reported to have a million and a quarter SHOCK troops on the west. The Russians have fully as many in the east. What the Germans have to meet this mighty hammer and anvil we outsiders don't know.

There are reports as this is written that the "severely mauled and bewildered Wehrmacht" appears nowhere able to check our advances.

THE weather has worsened a little, with a drizzling rain falling on the western front, but our air force is still operating effectively and the rain isn't heavy enough (as yet) to turn the roads to quagmires.

THE Japs say we're "attempting" landings on Okinawa, in the Ryukyus. The landings, Tokyo radio asserts, are covered by a fleet including 15 carriers, 11 battleships, 10 cruisers, 32 destroyers and "innumerable" auxiliary vessels.

It may be so. The Ryukyus, of which Okinawa is the most important, screen the entrance to the East China sea, which is Japan's gateway to China by way of the valleys of the Yangtze and the Yellow rivers and their interconnecting canals and related rail systems.

If we are landing on Okinawa, so soon after Iwo Jima and without the usual protracted bombing and bombardment, it speaks volumes for our confidence in the power we have at hand and ready for use.

A MEDAL FOR WALTER

Our Distinguished Service Medal for particularly meritorious service on the home front goes today to Walter Cloake, janitor at the Medical Arts building. Since the last waste paper campaign, Walter has diligently salvaged every available scrap of paper.

When the collection is made next month, we hope something is done to bring in a large accumulation of paper from Riversdale. We have a letter from a resident of that community, who reports that children scammed all over the community last December gathering up waste paper, which was stored at the schoolhouse.

The condition at Riversdale probably is duplicated in numerous other sections.

Douglas county has a particularly poor record in war salvage. We do not believe this is due to any lack of patriotism or willingness to cooperate in salvage efforts. The fault, if such it can be called, lies in the manpower shortage.

It has been extremely difficult to find persons with the time and organizational ability needed to direct extremely detailed salvage campaigns. We also are handicapped because our very rapid industrial growth has brought utilization of all warehouse space, making it impossible to store salvage materials between campaigns.

The paper shortage is becoming increasingly critical, emphasizing the need for general cooperation in the forthcoming campaign. A quick glance over Oregon newspapers gives some indication of the seriousness of the situation.

The Medford Mail-Tribune, which was forced recently to freeze its circulation, is taking an "advertising holiday." Medford subscribers are being furnished a four-page paper each day this week with all display advertising eliminated.

But the effect upon newspapers is unimportant when one considers the more vital and essential uses of paper in the war effort. Paper is used for cartons in shipping plasma, food, ammunition, etc. It forms protective cases for artillery shells.

OKINAWA, in the center of the Ryukyus screen, is a relatively big island, some 75 miles long by three to 15 miles wide. Its population is around 400,000, and its southern part is good land, highly cultivated.

It is reef-fringed, but once ashore we would have several miles of flat land, suitable for tanks and war of maneuver on a small scale. It would be totally different from Iwo Jima—more like Leyte.

THE Japs are still pushing westward in central China, on a fairly wide front. They do not seem as yet to have been materially checked by the Chinese or by anything our air forces there have been able to do in the way of support to the Chinese.

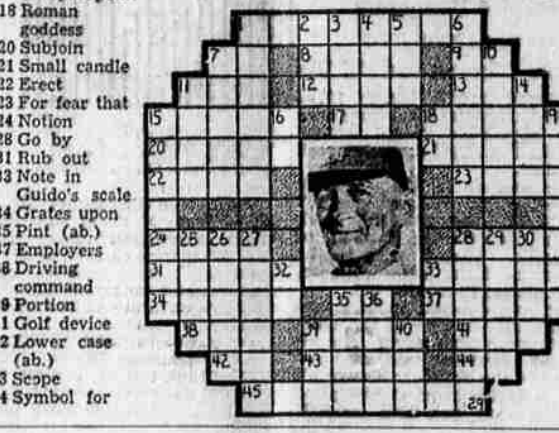
