Blood Donor News. Exceeding its quota for the fourth straight year, the American Red Cross blood donor service in 1944 procured 371,664 pints more than their estimated requirements, it was announced today by Basil O'Connor, Red Cross national chairman. "Despite this magnificent record, we must not let down," he said. The drain on supplies is enormous and numerous cases have been reported in which 20 or more pints of plasma have been required to save one man. We must obtain approximately 100,000 additional pints of blood

every week to keep the armed forces fully supplied. Visitor.—Dwight Lear, of the Portland veterans administration, spent Monday and Tuesday here on his monthly visit to the chapter.

*EGG AND SAUSAGE SCRAMBLE

Eggs scrambled with pork sausage and bread.
1/2 pound bulk pork sausage 6 eggs
3 cups finely cubed bread 6 tbsp. milk
Fry sausage in hot frying pan; pour off half the fat; add bread cubes; fry with sausage until well browned; add eggs and milk beaten together. Cook slowly, stirring with a fork until eggs are firm but still soft. Serves 4 to 6.
Note: Finely diced bacon or ham may be substituted for the sausage.
