Bull Rescued After 12 Days in Sump Hole's Grip

REEDSPORT—It wasn't a "bull in a China shop" but the bull was found in a cesspool at the Lake Tahkenitch resort last Thursday, according to Harold Fowler, manager. This white bull, the property of Mr. Fairfield, a resident of Gardiner, had been missing from the Fairchild ranch at Three Mile lake for some time and was last seen near Tahkenitch lake about twelve days previous to its discovery in the 6 x 6 x 10 foot sump hole on the Fowler property. As near as can

be ascertained the animal has been in the hole, where it had fallen, all of that time without food other than what it could nibble from the surrounding banks. When the rescuers dug a trench to release the trapped animal, it could barely walk up the slight incline to level ground and its front ankles were so weak that its hoofs turned over every few steps.
