Declaring that fern fires destroy young growing trees but do not kill the fern roots, he asked ranchers not to repeat last spring's fern fires, which destroyed 1800 acres of forest. He advised blowing up the ferns and then burning the roots as the only method of eliminating the pest.

Lewis' Extension Of Contract Bans Coal Area Strike

WASHINGTON, April 2—(AP)—John L. Lewis dispelled the threat of a nationwide coal strike today by a zero hour extension of the expired bituminous contract through April.

His action came after the War Labor board ordered an indefinite continuance of the agreement beyond its Saturday midnight deadline with any wage adjustments to date from April 1. The operators, who had asked for a 30-day limit on their retroactive pay obligation, agreed unconditionally to the board's order.

But Lewis, irked over the loss of retroactive wage increases in the seven-month controversy of 1945, imposed the until-May 1—only reservation on his acceptance.

This set the stage for another possible crisis in a month, but both miners and operators were hopeful they could work out a new contract before then. Negotiators, who planned to resume their conferences today, reflected this optimism despite Lewis' statements at the WLB hearing Saturday.

The UMW president told the board that a month of negotiating had failed to bring the parties together on any of his 18 demands, and that future meetings with the producers appeared fruitless.

However, Lewis agreed to further conferences "out of courtesy, if nothing else," when Edward R. Burke, representing the southern coal producers association, suggested that some of the issues could be ironed out, thus narrowing the problems for the board to dispose of.

Nazi Guerrillas Given Name of "Werewolves"

LONDON, April 2—(AP)—Formation of German guerrilla bands called Werewolves was proclaimed last night by Berlin, and the Moscow radio commented today: "The wolf hunt is on—good hunting."

Berlin exhorted all Germans in occupied areas to support the Werewolves and continue to fight the allies. The broadcast said the name was taken from German mythology. It described Werewolves as wild beings who hide in forests and "pounce on all God's creatures with towering rage."
