OPA Disturbed by Sheep Liquidation; Price Hike Sought

WASHINGTON, April 3.—(AP)—Liquidation of their holdings by sheepmen has been a matter of concern to the OPA. Chester Bowles, OPA head, said today in a letter to senator Thomas (R-Idaho). Bowles expressed belief, however, that this has been due partly at least to labor shortages. Bowles' letter replied to a request by Thomas for higher ceiling prices on lamb carcasses to permit increased returns on live animals. Thomas said that because of increased labor, equipment and feed costs over the past two years, many sheepmen have been forced to sell their herds and go into other business. "This office has been concerned over the liquidation taking place in the past two years," Bowles wrote. "However, the War Food administration, which is responsible for the farm production program, has made no recommendation for any change in our price ceilings to obtain production for war purposes." Bowles added, however, that the lamb situation would be studied further, and Thomas announced that he would continue to press his demands for higher prices.

Schools' Participation In Bond Drive Arranged

Notices and material on "schools at war" have been sent to all schools in the county in preparation for the war bond drive. Mrs. Lula C. Gorrell, county school superintendent, stated today. All schools are expected to participate and emphasis is being placed on the participation of 90 per cent of the pupils in purchase stamps and bonds. Mrs. Gorrell said. The quota to be raised in the schools is \$24,000 as estimated by the state, she said.

Legislators Named to Inspect Oregon's Jails

SALEM, Ore., April 3.—(AP)—President of the Senate Belton and Speaker Marsh, today appointed the five members of the legislative interim committee to investigate facilities of all prison and all jail facilities in the state. Members are Sens. Fredrick S. Lamport, Salem, and Frank H. Hilton, Portland; and Reps. H. R. Jones, Salem; and Pat Lonergan and Jack Bain, both of Portland.

Hecklers Beset New Anti-Japanese League

BELLEVUE, Wash., April 3.—(AP)—Organizers of a Japanese Exclusion league here last night told opponents among the 500 attending the meeting "to hire a hall" to voice their convictions. Hecklers were threatened with ejection during speeches by Attorney George H. Crandall, Seattle attorney, and A. E. McCroskey, the league's executive organizer, also of Seattle. All but about 100 raised their hands in answer to McCroskey's invitation to express favor for excluding from the United States all American-born Japanese. Ushers immediately passed through the audience inviting \$10 contributions. The door prize, awarded to those who gave names and addresses for follow-up visits by organizers, was a bust of General MacArthur.

Oregon Cities Listed for National Cemeteries

WASHINGTON, April 3.—(AP)—The War department will ask congress for a \$122,900,000 appropriation to return American dead of World War II for burial in 79 proposed national cemeteries throughout the country. A total of 5,335,000 graves is provided for by the War department in the proposed cemeteries. Eligible for burial in national cemeteries are all honorably discharged veterans of any United States war, their wives or widows and members of women's branches of the armed forces. Cemetery locations recommended by the war department include: Oregon: Portland, 50,000; Klamath Falls, 25,000.

Austrian Industrialist Arrested in Argentina

BUENOS AIRES, April 3.—(AP)—Fritz Mandl, former Austrian munitions magnate, was held incommunicado today on unannounced charges and the Argentine government announced it would seize his big metal and plastics manufacturing company, which has been on the allied blacklist for six months. Mandl came to Argentina in 1937 after transferring a large part of his fortune—reported to be about \$60,000,000—to this country.
