Oakland Booster Club Hears Talks By Mill Executives

The Oakland Booster club was host Monday night to many prominent business men, servicemen, ex-servicemen and the Oakland High school basketball team. Among the guests present were A. K. Wilson new owner of the mill in Oakland; his general manager, William Wallace; Ben Wallace, manager of the Rose Motor Co. of Roseburg; and less Atkins, manager of logging operations.

William Wallace was delegated by Mr. Wilson to carry the burden of making a short but informative talk, concerning the A. W. Wilson Co., its plants and what was necessary to make a successful business.

Mr. Wallace based his talk around two well-known rules, "Love Thy Neighbor, and Do Unto Others as You Would Have Them do Unto You." He explained that all markets, and businesses were just merely people, neighbors and friends, and that religion should play a much larger part in the intimate lives of businesses and business men. He went on to explain that industry was going at such a pace that lots of men did not think they had the time to spare to even say grace at a banquet or even at their own dinner table. He stated that the lack of transportation existing in southern Oregon was deplorable and, although the full meaning of this lack wasn't felt now, that when the war is over and business goes back into the competitive field, stock ranchers, turkey raisers, sheep ranchers and the lumber industry, would be squeezed out by other concerns in the northern part of the state who had access to cheap transportation to nearby markets, and shipping facilities. He urged that committees be formed all over the county to take this problem directly to the government, and to include Senator Guy Canby who is making such a fight in Washington to provide necessary transportation, and freight rates to allow Douglas county business to be in the competitive field along with the rest of the state on an equal basis.

Mr. Wilson then told the club that Oakland was not to be a boom town, but to be a substantial part of the community in the years to come. He explained that most boom towns dwindled to ghost towns as soon as the boom was over, and it was his contention that this should not happen to Oakland. He also stated that only key men necessary to keep the mill and veneer plant going would be brought in, and that the common labor necessary would be recruited from the nearby towns and communities. In his box factory women can handle existing jobs, which should put many idle hands to work. He also stated that he now had purchased all the land and timber necessary for production for many years to come but needed more timber to

permit a sustained yield operation. He concluded his speech by answering various questions raised by the club. A short quiz was then conducted by two of the members. Awards for correct answers consisted of one cigarette per person, which were much appreciated.

William "Bill" Manning presided over the meeting.
