happy hunting ground the sub-human Jap aspires to go.

DON'T let yourself be fooled by talk of an easy job on Okinawa. It will be tough enough by the time it is finished.

WE make another landing at the southern tip of big Luzon, which is being cut up into slices and finished off—much as Germany will be.

ON Okinawa, we're beginning to encounter a few WOMEN in Jap uniforms. The scrawny natives are beginning to come out of their holes and caves to surrender to us.

HERE'S a significant little item in the Pacific news: Navy Liberators have gone in to the YANGTZE ESTUARY to smash Jap river craft.

THE Jap radio says that Tokyo is being rebuilt—UNDER GROUND. It is probably true.

EISENHOWER tells us that the Ruhr has been effectively encircled. The fate of the German forces trapped there (supposed to be the best the nazis have in the west) is sealed, he says, and they are ripe for annihilation.

We're proceeding apace, the dispatches indicate, with the job of annihilating them.

The British, swinging around to the left after their crossing of the Rhine, are reported within 20 miles of the Zuyder Zee and 60 miles of the North sea.

PATTON'S 3rd army is going so fast it has been blacked out of the news again. A late dispatch from the front places it in the outskirts of Gotha—THREE-FOURTHS of the way across the reich to Czechoslovakia and 140 miles from Berlin.

Patton is probably headed for a junction with the Russians somewhere in Saxony.

PATTON'S 7th army is rampaging up Wurtzburg and is menacing Nurnberg, reported this morning to be only 14 miles away.

THE Russians are flowing steadily around Vienna. To the east, down the Danube, they are fighting in the outskirts of Bratislava.

THE Germans are giving every evidence of a last-man stand in Vienna. The Berlin radio says Hitler has sent the chief of his personal bodyguard there to mobilize the city against the Rus-

WESTWARD MIGRATION

Michigan, Ohio, Indiana and Illinois will contribute to Oregon's new population after the war, judging from inquiries being received by the Roseburg chamber of commerce.

It is very interesting to notice the trends from year-to-year in requests made by prospective homeseekers for chamber of commerce information.

For a number of years the greatest volume of inquiry mail has come from California. Many of the writers are elderly people seeking farms, particularly adjacent to good fishing streams, where they may retire.

For a considerable period of time, inquiries, other than from California, were principally from the Dust Bowl—Oklahoma, Arkansas and the Dakotas.

Early in the war there was a great increase in communications from Texas. Until recently, we are informed by Harold Hickerson, secretary of the chamber of commerce, Texas has held second place to California in the number of persons planning to move into Oregon.

During the past few months there has been a great increase in inquiries from Michigan, Ohio, Indiana and Illinois.

Typical is the letter of an Ohio resident who proposes to establish a new business in Roseburg—a business similar to the one he now conducts in Ohio and in which he is thoroughly experienced.

Secretary Hickerson reports he is answering scores of inquiries each week.

Prospective new settlers are about equally divided between farmers and persons desiring to find employment in business or industry.

It further is interesting to note that the majority of people writing for information report sufficient wealth to establish themselves without incurring debt.

Inquiries from New England states have been extremely rare in previous years, but recently rapidly increasing interest has been shown in Oregon by residents of that area.

Another group of inquiries represents war workers in the national capital. Of the thousands of clerks and minor officials who will be thrown out of work when the emergency ends, large numbers, judging from their letters, plan to migrate to the Pacific coast and many are looking to Oregon.

Douglas county's bright industrial future is becoming most widely recognized and promises to attract a large number of high-type citizens in the months and years to come.

WE and the British and the Russians are going to stick together until that is finished. There will be a lot of arguing and jockeying and a certain amount of bluffing, but we'll probably stick together for the big job of cleaning up Europe afterward.
