PROCESSED FOODS—Book 4: Blue stamps X3 through B2 valid through March 31. Red stamps C3 through G2 valid through April 30. Blue stamps H2 through M2 valid through June 2. Blue stamps N2 through S2 valid through June 30.

MEAT, BUTTER, CHEESE—Book 4: Red stamps Q3 through S3 valid through March 31. Red stamps T3 through Y3 valid through April 30. Red stamps Z3 through D2 valid through June 2. Red stamps E2 through J2 valid through June 30.

SUGAR—Book 4: Sugar stamp 35 valid through June 2.

STOVES—Loose stamps invalid. Book 3: Airplane stamps 1-2-3 now valid.

"A" coupons not valid unless endorsed. "A" coupons, 4 gal. each, valid through March 31. "A" 15 coupons, 4 gal. each, valid through June 21.

STOVES—Apply local board for oil gas stove certificates.

WOOD COAL SAWDUST—Dealer determines delivery priority from consumer's written statement of annual needs and quantity on hand.

FUEL OIL—Series 1-3 (fuel) coupons valid through April 31. Not more than 75% of season's ration should have been used to date in Portland area, 75% in Roseburg area, and 85% in North Head area.
